





Golder Ranch Fire District PSPRS Pension Debt Profile: How do we compare to our peers?



Accruing at 7.30%, the District's pension payments are among the fastest escalating costs on the District's budget

- The District participates in Arizona PSPRS for its employees and retirees
- The District's plan is 69.9% funded as of 6/30/2020
- The plan's unfunded liability accrues at an assumed rate of 7.30%, well above what the District might pay on its debt
 - The actuarial rate was revised from 7.40% to 7.30% in the 2019 valuation, causing the UAAL to increase



Overview of Key Terms.

- Actuarially Accrued Liability ("AAL"). The present value of all future benefit payments payable to current and future retirees
- Actuarial Value of Assets ("AVA"). The current value of all assets held/invested by PSPRS to generate returns and make benefit payments to retirees
- Funded Ratio. The ratio of AVA to AAL; 100% funding implies Assets = Liabilities
- Unfunded Actuarially Accrued Liability ("UAAL"). The difference between the AAL and AVA

Recommendation:

- Refinance pension liability using other debt obligations to:
 - Achieve 100% funding levels (top 2.5% percentile nationally); greater assets will also allow the pension funds to improve investment efficiency and liquidity for paying benefits
 - Lower borrowing rate on \$28.6 million unfunded liability from 7.30% to approximately 2.52% (depending on market conditions)
 - Generate budgetary stability and projected savings to address other needs and prevent crowding out of other priorities by escalating pension expenses



10-Year US Treasury Note: Past 10 Years¹ (Data through March 3, 2021)




Use COPs Proceeds to Eliminate Current Pension Legacy Liability¹



Issuing pension Obligations to fully fund the District's unfunded pension liabilities could allow the District to generate significant expected net present value benefit totaling \$16.99 million (59.43% of pension fund deposit), including establishing a Contingency Reserve Fund ("CRF") while leveling out year-over-year payments

- Reducing the District's upward curving pension UAAL payments could significantly lower the District's long-term unfunded pension liability cost while providing annual savings for the District to use each year at its discretion
- Our structure is designed to produce level annual savings while also providing contingency reserve funds for the District
- As summarized below, *this scenario could produce \$16,990,514 of expected total NPV savings*, including \$13,236,348 from reduced annual UAAL payments, \$3,729,326 from creation of a Contingency Reserve Fund, and \$24,841 from interest on the CRF assumed at 0.05%

What are the risks associated with issuing pension obligations v. the status quo?



Pension liability management carries four distinct types of risks: i) market risk, ii) actuarial risk, iii) sizing risk, and iv) other risks

Risk Description	Status Quo	Pension Obligations
Market Risk. All pension plans are subject to changes in market conditions and year-over-year investment return performance. The assumed rate of return should ideally approximate a plan's long-term historical average returns	Performance studies allow actuaries to examine whether current return assumptions remain in line with actual performance. For example, many plans nationally have revised their actuarial rate to 7.00%	 Primary risk is investment return performance over lifetime of obligations An issuer of pension obligations will remain better off for doing the bonding as long as investment returns remain above the bond rate
Actuarial Risk. Any retirement system's independent actuaries calculate projections for plan assets and liabilities, and these projections are premised on a variety of assumptions such as investment returns, payroll increase, COLA, mortality, early retirement, and benefit payments. Annual employer contributions are calculated based on these assumptions	 Actuarial risk is inherent to all pension funds, and all projections of future contributions and payouts Any revision or variance from these assumptions will alter projections and required contributions, regardless of the issuance of pension obligations 	Pension obligations address the unfunded liability at a given point in time by swapping the assumed rate of return with a market-based borrowing rate that is locked in at the time of issuance. Mitigating Risks: Contingency Reserve Fund



The District can apply a portion of obligation proceeds to create a Contingency Reserve Fund that helps manage market and actuarial risks associated with COPs

- What? Helps mitigate risks associated with year-over-year volatility in investment earnings as well as changes in actuarial assumptions, such as assumed rate of return, COLA, mortality
- How? Use a portion of obligation proceeds to establish an initial balance in CRFs for the Police and Fire Plans, respectively
 - Apply a defined portion of ongoing year-over-year budgetary savings from the pension obligation (difference between what UAAL payments would have been versus debt service costs) to continue funding CRF
- Why? In years where investment returns do not meet defined/established benchmarks, and/or changes in actuarial assumptions cause a significant change in projected annual payments, the District can draw on the CRF to smooth the budgetary impact of funding additional contributions for the newly created UAAL
- Why not? Negative carry of issuing additional debt to fund an upfront deposit

Rules for Investment of Proceeds. This is akin to permitted investment guidelines for reserve/escrow funds

• Proceeds should only be invested in liquid and/or short-term products to ensure prompt availability of funds

Rules for CRF Draws. While there may be greater flexibility to accord broader rules for draws on an CRF absent obligation proceeds, in practice, permitting draws for any/every possible increase in payments could deplete the balance too soon

- The District may consider establishing a minimum fund balance threshold before which draws on the balance of the CRF could occur
- Draws may also be restricted to draws of investment income only, while the balance is untouched
- Establish periodic funded ratio thresholds, where CRF balance above a pre-defined level is drawn to supplement ARC

Rules for Contingency Replenishment. Could use ongoing pension obligation savings or use *sell the float* on other District held funds for periodic inflows

- The District must also consider mechanisms to build up and/or maintain the CRFs balance by securing a stream of steady cash flow beyond the initial deposit
- This entails defining the revenue and investment sources for fiscal transparency, and redirecting investment returns in excess of an established benchmark to the Contingency Reserve Fund

Other Considerations: Proposition 207 Implications 1,2,3



Based on the State's revenue expectations once the recreational marijuana marketplace and tax is fully implemented, the District could expect to receive approximately \$347,229 of incremental, annual revenue

- In November 2020, Arizona Proposition 207 (legalization and taxation of recreational marijuana) passed after receiving approximately 60% approval
- The State will establish a 16% excise tax on the sale of marijuana products, and provide incremental revenue to police and fire departments (31.4% of excise tax revenue) over time
 - According to a State Fiscal Analysis of the proposition based on revenues from recreational marijuana sales in Colorado, Oregon, Washington, Nevada and California, the State expects approximately \$161 million of annual revenue from the 16% excise tax once "the program becomes more fully operational" in Calendar Year 2023
 - This implies that \$50,659,800 will be allocable to police and fire districts in 2023
 - The 31.4% of revenue will be distributed to municipal police and fire departments **based** on the number of individuals from each department enrolled in PSPRS
 - As of 6/30/2020, the District had 253 total PSPRS members (active, inactive, retirees, Drop retirees, beneficiaries, disability retirees, and inactive/vested members), which represents 0.685% of PSPRS' 36,912 total members³
 - This implies <u>the District could expect to receive approximately \$347,229 annually from the 16% excise tax</u> (once the marketplace and tax are fully implemented, and assuming the State's Fiscal Analysis assumptions are met)
- Many jurisdictions that have recently legalized recreational marijuana have found the runway to establishing retail sales infrastructure to be longer than, and tax revenues to be smaller than, originally projected
- Nonetheless, this incremental revenue could be used to repay the District's unfunded pension liabilities more quickly than re quired
- However, with the unfunded pension liability accruing at a rate of 7.3%, a significant portion of payments would go towards interest on the unfunded liability as opposed to the liability itself
- On the other hand, pension obligation proceeds would be used to reduce (or potentially eliminate) the known unfunded liability, ending the accruing 7.3% interest on a portion of unfunded liability and replacing it with a lower bond interest rate

Arizona Proposition 207¹ *Marijuana Legalization Initiative*

The law would allow limited marijuana possession, use, and cultivation by adults 21 or older; amend criminal penalties for marijuana possession; ban smoking marijuana in public; impose a 16% excise tax on marijuana sales to fund public programs; authorize state/local regulation of marijuana licensees; and allow expungement of marijuana offenses.

- <u>Assumption</u>: Cost of living a djustments ("COLAs") will be as anticipated when the unfunded actuarial liability was estimated at COP issuance. <u>Risk</u>: If COLAs exceed expectations during the term of the COPs, and the increases are not offset by positive changes in other assumptions, the COP proceeds will not suffice to cover the unfunded actuarial liability.
- Assumption: Various assumptions used in calculating the unfunded actuarial liability -- such as mortality rates, early retirement incentives, types of payrolls covered by the pension fund -- will be as anticipated at the time of COP issuance. February 2021

Meetings, Trainings & Events Attended for the Month

I conducted command weekly staff briefings and direct reports meetings.

I conducted the monthly Fire Chief's status meeting with all managers and chief officers within the District.

We conducted the monthly governing board meeting via Zoom. The intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with Pima County for immunization reimbursement was passed unanimously.

I met with the Board Chair Cox-Golder prior to the board meeting.

I attended our Operations team meeting.

I met with President Jones of the Local 3832. We discussed a variety of issues and scheduled meetings for the coming weeks. Later, we met again and with other local labor leaders to tour the new Southern Arizona Firefighters Association union hall.

Chiefs Cesarek, Robb, Pearce and I attended the Oro Valley Project Graduation golf tournament. This very important fundraiser has been significantly impacted by COVID. The tournament was held over a period of three days to provide for spacing of the participants. In speaking with the president of Project Graduation, Jim Miller, they are still hopeful that continued support from the community will be there to allow them to provide a safe environment for the graduates this fall.

I attended Northwest Fire District (NWFD) Assistant Chief Doug Emans' retirement luncheon. Doug started with NWFD in 1994 and was my immediate supervisor. As the years went on, I ended up being his supervisor. Doug is a talented leader that has worked very hard over the years and has earned his retirement.

I participated in a conference call with the executive board of the Arizona Fire Services Institute (AFSI) to discuss multiple legislative issues. I also served as Chairman of the AFSI. See attached agenda.

I attended and participated in an Arizona Fire Chiefs Association (AFCA) mutual aid training meeting via Zoom.

I attended a breakfast meeting with the Pima County Fire Chiefs. This monthly meeting with the Fire Chiefs was extremely valuable and allowed for a much more manageable forum for discussions on best practice, collaborative efforts, and challenges the Pima County Fire Service has been facing.

I attended the Securis (workers' compensation pool) board meeting serving as a board member. The cost for our workers' compensation pool will be increasing this year by approximately 5%.

I attended the Oro Valley Council meeting virtually. The El Conquistador 9-hole golf course was on the agenda and there was significant participation from the public. The meeting went over four hours with many public speakers addressing the Council. In the end, the Council will be looking at costs and options regarding maintenance of the course, or having a third party maintain it.

Political & Public Safety Interactions & Updates

Attached please find the Arizona Fire Districts Association (AFDA) legislative update and political report.

- o I have been actively working with members of the AFCA and AFDA to introduce legislation that will clarify the roles of stake holders and their ability to address needs and concerns related to a Certificate of Need (CON). Please follow this link to view the legislation:

- I participated in several Zoom meetings and conference calls with AFDA and AFCA leadership regarding strategy on testimony and dialog with legislators.
- O I testified on February 10th in the Senate Finance Committee on SB1298 related to Certificates of Participations (COPs) for fire districts. It passed 6-2-2. I was scheduled to testify on HB2455, which is the mirror bill of SB1298, but the bill was not heard in committee because of time constraints. It was rescheduled. I am thankful I was not

waiting at the Capitol for the committee meeting. Being in my office on Zoom allowed me to multitask, not to mention avoid the 4-hour burn and return to Phoenix. Please follow this link: <u>\$1298i</u>

- o I testified in the House Government and Elections Committee on HB 2455 regarding fire districts' pension liability and financing; this is the House COP bill. It passed out of committee 10-1. The COP bill will be on the floor in both the House and Senate. If passed, it will move to the governor to signature. I spent quite a bit of time speaking to our legislators about this.
- o I testified in the House Health and Human Services committee meeting on HB 2802. It was not voted on and did not leave the committee.
- o I had multiple conference calls with senators and representatives on multiple bills.
- I had multiple discussions and Zoom calls with legislators regarding the COP bill. Additionally, I personally delivered packets of information to them for better comprehension on the impact to GRFD.
- o The Arizona Fire Marshal's Association is formally opposing SB1334 which allows for a larger variety of aerial fireworks. See attached.

I went to the Tucson legislative office to renew my agreement to be a speaker at the Arizona State Legislature.

I attended the planning session for the upcoming "Fire Chief's Academy" through the AFCA virtually. This was following input we received from city managers, town managers, and board of directors in what they would like to see in a fire chief. Thank you to Town of Oro Valley Manager Jacobs for participating. We will use this information to develop the program which we hope to deliver in spring of 2022.

I had dialog with Pima County Board of Supervisors Rex Scott's executive staff. Rex Scott replaced Ally Miller as the District 1 Supervisor in Pima County. Later, I met with Supervisor Scott and his executive staff via Zoom. We spent about an hour discussing our organization, the Big Horn Fire impact, the auto aid system, fire service in Pima County, and ways to work collectively to benefit the businesses and residents of District 1.

As I have previously reported, we have been experiencing significant difficulties and delays regarding systems and processes at our communications center at the City of Tucson. I have been working directly with Interim Director Kasmar, Tucson Fire Department (TFD) Chief Ryan and NWFD Chief Bradley to address our many concerns. We have all agreed that a more proactive fire department presence in that environment is needed to help drive and steer changes. At my direction, Golder Ranch Fire District (GRFD) will be taking a much more

aggressive and active role in the management of our contract with the communications center. A senior-level liaison (an assistant chief with decision-making authority) will be assigned to transition the contractual arrangement we currently have to a performance-based contract. Further, along with our automatic aid partners, TFD and NWFD, GRFD will provide a captain, acting as a supervisor, to be placed at the center 24 hours per day to monitor, guide, and assist dispatchers beginning July 1, 2021. This was discussed with the Board in the 2020 budget process and we will budget for this in the upcoming fiscal year 2021-2022. Working collectively with Director Kasmar, we strive to address not only the issues identified, but more importantly, the issues that we have seen impact our ability to provide service to our greater community. I had further dialog with Chiefs Ryan and Bradley again later in the month regarding the ongoing challenges at the communications center.

We continued to see a decline in COVID-19 related numbers to include transports. Although these were very encouraging, we continued to be compliant with the guidelines and recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Arizona State Health Department. On the February agenda was an IGA that will allow for us to provide immunizations to the community and be reimbursed by Pima County. This agreement, which we have been working on since December, is an essential part of the overall process. This will also have a reimbursement component that previously had not been included.

I had a video conference with Jennifer Schomberg, Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Oro Valley (OVH) and Northwest Hospitals (NWH). We had a very in-depth conversation on wait times in the emergency rooms, COVID-19 vaccinations, expanding services, collaborative programs (community paramedic), and other items. She was very complimentary of our crews, explaining that she has had absolutely no complaints from either NWH or OVH ER staff regarding GRFD personnel. She made a point to say that our personnel are ALWAYS polite and courteous to her staff. She went on that our staff are direct when they need to be, but always professional. I have heard that that is not always the case for other fire agencies, which makes me very proud of our GRFD team.

I attended a "code save" recognition at Oro Valley Police Department (OVPD). Oro Valley Police Chief Riley presided over a meeting between an Oro Valley resident who experienced a heart attack and the first responders from OVPD, NWFD and GRFD who saved him. Chief Cesarek also presented a "code save" challenge coin to the officers and responders. This was a perfect example of our exceptional public safety and automatic aid responses system. OVPD responds to all EMS calls in the Town of Oro Valley and they were on the scene initiating CPR in less than 2 minutes. NWFD Engine 330 was the closest fire unit arriving moments later with GRFD Medic 377 on their heels arriving to provide rapid transport to the hospital. The

partnership between all the agencies saved this man's life. A 42-year-old father of two will be able to watch his children grow up and enjoy many years with his wife. This was such an awesome story and example of our innovative response system in Oro Valley.

I met with NWFD Chief Bradley and Rincon Valley Fire District (RVFD) Chief Kahle over lunch to discuss communications and mutual/automatic aid. Unfortunately, TFD Chief Ryan was unable to join us due to a last minute adjustment.

District Activities for the Month

I attended the virtual "meet and greet" for the new academy recruits and their families. Although attending virtually was not as personal, or as effective as face to face, it was so energizing to meet and engage with those who are just beginning their career. Sometimes I think we forget how impactful the academy experience is for these young people. Also, it is a good reminder of how important it is for all of us to reflect on the culture we have at GRFD and how to make it better for those in the future. Of course, we have had our challenges, especially recently, but who has not seen challenges in these times. However, I truly believe that the foundational desire of every person at GRFD is to do exactly that, "make it better for those in the future!" Together we can! The academy began February 8th.

The command staff attended Academy 21-1 day one to introduce themselves. I addressed the academy and provided my "character spiel." See attached. I also provided a document that I adapted to the fire service entitled, "All I need to know I learned in Kindergarten."

I have engaged the services of consulting company, Ironwood Solutions, to write a grant for us under the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Fire Prevention Category. The scope of the proposed project would be to conduct a Community Risk Assessment and Standards of Cover. Our current community risk assessment/standards of cover document is very outdated from 2013, therefore, a more recent document is needed for Insurance Service Office (ISO) rating as well as any accreditation that we may receive. If are successful in the grant award, there will be a minimal matching fee. If we are not successful with the grant, there will be a cost. Either way, we need to complete the documents, but we are hopeful to be successful in the grant process.

Our Human Resources (HR) Division has been participating in an audit of our immigration documentation by a special agent from the Homeland Security Department. Several issues with I-9 forms were identified and have been addressed.

I attended our quarterly benefits utilization review meeting with our benefits broker, Ed Gussio, from Crest and Labor representatives, Pettit and Johnson. We have seen a significant increase in the utilization of our benefits which will likely translate into an increase in our benefit costs next fiscal year. We have been working on cost-saving strategies while avoiding any impact to our benefit package. I was also involved in several phone calls and conference calls with Ed Gussio and senior leadership from our provider, Blue Cross/Blue Shield. We have been working diligently to address not only the increases in healthcare costs, but also the relationship between our healthcare provider and workers' compensation pool.

I attended a presentation with the HR staff and Chief Brandhuber regarding a proposal from another healthcare broker. Although we have been happy with our current benefit structure and plan, we have been doing our due diligence to ensure we provide the best coverage to our personnel while remaining cost effective.

I attended a presentation with the HR staff and Chief Brandhuber regarding the administrative compensation survey from our consultant, Igor, with HR Knows. This very in-depth presentation outlined the changes to our step and grade system that mirrors what was done in suppression a couple of years ago. We have been diligently trying to address pay compression while also ensuring that we have a competitive wage scale. The Board will likely see this presentation at the March board meeting. The suppression compensation survey will be initiated at the beginning of the fiscal year.

I met with Finance Manager Christian, Chief Robb, and Chief Brandhuber to discuss adjustments in the current budget to absorb the unanticipated overtime costs we have experienced this past year. Much of the overtime costs were attributed to COVID-19, but some were simply from being short staffed. We have been submitting for grants and reimbursement from the federal government to help to offset some of the COVID costs, but we must take measures to better manage our overtime.

I reviewed the recommendations from the committee on the station 374 addition. This will include turnout gear storage, decontamination room, station security, and an additional storage room. The committee did a great job and we will be moving forward with drawings. This will be funded by the bond.

Our new office furniture was finally delivered and we were able to open our front lobby. This was part of our administration lobby remodel that was done to provide more security and separation for our administrative assistants that greet our constituents. This much-needed

improvement was part of the security enhancement project that has been going on throughout the District.

I released an adjustments of responsibilities and organizational chart adjustment. This will help to provide improved communication to the majority of the organization, address critical strategic priorities related to IT, geographic information system (GIS) and fire alarm communications liaison, while also allowing succession and mentoring of operational personnel. I continued my efforts to meet with crews and individuals of the District. I had several meetings throughout the month. Community Relations Manager Braswell accompanied me to many of the meetings to take notes.

- I had breakfast with the station 373 crew and Battalion Chief Price. We discussed a variety of topics to include succession planning, future station construction, organizational changes, and leadership.
- I met with Chief Perry and Captain Wilson to discuss personal protective equipment (PPE), mentorship, and succession planning.
- o I had a Zoom meeting with all the Operations battalion chiefs, division chiefs, and deputy chief. We discussed the temporary organizational chart, departure of Chief Hurguy, and the expectations moving forward. Several chief officers requested individual meetings which I have been facilitating.
- I met with several chief officers, including division chiefs, battalion chiefs, and captains regarding the recent changes, the reporting structure, and my message to the organization. I met with some individually and others as a group.
- o I attended "Chats with the Chief" at stations 378, 370, and 372.

Administrative Assistant Maggie Hernandez was tasked with bringing back the "Burning Issues" newsletter. I provided my "article" to her, which was the Chief's Message for the quarter. She did an awesome job with this! Please take a look: <u>Burning Issues - February 2021</u>

GRFD, NWFD and TFD fought a working trailer fire with extensions to another building in NWFD's southern area. Our automatic aid system has definitely been exercised and we have been working to resolve minor differences in operating procedures.

We responded to a fatal mobile home fire in Catalina. Upon arrival, crews found a well-involved fire in a mobile home with a bedridden occupant still inside the residence. The crews encountered high heat and heavy smoke during the rescue operation, and unfortunately, the occupant had already expired prior to the rescue. We have been working with the Pima County Sheriff's Department on the investigation.

Congratulations to Firefighter Starkey and Fire Medic Wellman for delivering a BABY in the back of Medic 375! How cool is that! Nothing warms your heart more than placing a newborn in the arms of a new mother. Thanks to both of you for your compassion, skill, and heart! Great job!

Personnel Updates

Our personnel involved in the Medic 373 motor vehicle accident have continued to improve. The family liaisons remained in place for detailed questions, however, both were excited to receive phone calls, text messages, etc. I spoke, or attempted to speak via text message, with both of our injured employees. Both were doing well and anxious to return to duty. We hope and pray for their continued recovery.

Chief Brandhuber and I conducted interviews for the Human Resources Manager position. Please follow this link for result of the process: Regular Memo 21-007 HR Manager Promotion.

Several personnel were on scheduled paid time off (PTO) for the Rodeo holiday. We also had a significant amount of unscheduled, or last minute, PTO in suppression on that Friday, which required a significant number of overtime (OT) personnel (10 people on OT) to maintain minimum staffing.

Attached is the email sent by Chief Joshua Hurguy announcing his retirement from GRFD as well as his acceptance of a deputy chief's position near the Seattle, Washington area. Chief Hurguy has been an exceptional leader for our organization and a valuable part of the GRFD family for many years. We wish him and his family the absolute best in this new chapter of their lives. He will be missed!

Today is the 43rd day of the legislative session with 1,708 bills posted to date. This week is legislative "cross-over week", in which the Senate and House will work mostly from the floor throughout the week to clear the bills from the body of origin and transfer them to the opposite body for consideration. Rules and Appropriations are the only committees that meet this week. Floor calendars for COW and Third Read will be extensive this week and post daily: House & Senate Floor Calendars. Here are the top legislative issues fire service leaders should be aware of this week:

- 1. The Firefighter's cancer measure S1451: WORKERS' COMPENSATION; RATES; FIREFIGHTERS; CANCER passed 22-8 on Senate Third Read, and the mirror House bill, H2506: WORKERS' COMPENSATION; RATES; FIREFIGHTERS; CANCER passed 14-0 in a special House Military Affairs and Public Safety committee hearing last Friday. Anticipate H2506 will be scheduled for a Rules hearing and floor action later this week.
- The fire district pension debt refinancing bill <u>2455i</u>: FIRE DISTRICTS; PENSION LIABILITY; FINANCING passed 10-1 in a special House Government and Elections hearing last Wednesday and is on today's House Rules agenda. The Senate mirror bill, <u>S1298i</u>: FIRE DISTRICTS; PENSION LIABILITY; FINANCING is on today's Senate Rules agenda. Anticipate both H2455 and S1298 to be on floor calendars for votes later this week.

A fire district that contracts for fire and emergency medical services is authorized to designate the fire chief of the service provider as the fire chief of the fire district. On expiration of a fire district board member's term of office, the position is declared vacant unless otherwise filled at a general election. A vacancy that occurs on expiration of a term of office must be filled by appointment by a quorum of the district board within 90 days after the first day of the beginning of the new term of office. If the district board is unable to establish a quorum, the vacancy must be filled by the county board of supervisors. Fire district boards are required to obtain from a licensed or certified appraiser an appraisal of real property owned by the district to determine market value, and are prohibited from accepting a bid for the sale of that property that is less than 75 percent of the appraised market value. If the property has no market value or a net value of \$10,000 or less, the board is authorized to value the property by using a market analysis based on comparable sales. The board is allowed to sell or lease fire district property to any other governmental entity on any terms deemed to be advantageous to the fire district. If used for any other purpose, and if the district has general obligation bond voter authorization and available capacity under its debt limitations, both the available aggregate indebtedness capacity of the district and the principal amount authorized at the general obligation bond election for the district must be reduced by the amount of net premium used for that purpose. For districts that are formed after August 9, 2017 and before the effective date of this legislation and for which the district board consists of the governing body of the municipality or county with two additional district board members who were initially designated by an owner who owned the largest amount of privately owned acreage in the district at formation, at any time after receipt of a petition signed by the owners of a majority of the privately owned real property within the boundaries of the district as measured by square footage or acreage, the district board is authorized to adopt a resolution to permanently remove the two additional appointed district board members and their positions on the board. If a community facilities district will be governed by a governing body with two additional board members who are initially designated by the owner who owns the largest amount of privately-owned acreage in the district, the resolution ordering formation of the district is permitted to state, or the district board is permitted to adopt a resolution that provides, that those two additional members are permanently advisory nonvoting members. Increases the dependent tax credit to \$120 for each dependent who is under 17 years of age, from \$100, and to \$30 for each dependent who is at least 17 years of age, from \$25. Lowers the state equalization assistance property tax rate to \$0.3520 in tax year 2021, \$0.2776 in tax year 2022, and an unspecified amount (blank in original) in tax year 2023, from \$0.4426 in tax year 2020. Lowers the tax rate for class one property taxes to 17.5 percent for tax year 2022 and 17 percent for tax years beginning with 2023, from 18 percent in 2021. The maximum additional tax rate that a county fire district board may levy is increased to \$3.375 per \$100 of assessed valuation for tax year 2022 and \$3.50 per \$100 of assessed valuation for tax year 2023 and each tax year after, from \$3.25 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Retroactive to July 1, 2021, establishes a tax on vehicles propelled only by electricity, natural gas or propane of \$110 per year, and a tax on hybrid vehicles of \$44 per year. Income tax revisions are retroactive to tax years beginning January 1, 2021.

A county with a population of less than 200,000 persons is required to have a maximum of four voting centers, a county with a population of 200,000 persons or more and less than 1 million persons is required to have a maximum of eight voting centers, and a county with a population of 1 million persons or more is required to have a maximum of fifteen voting centers, as determined by the board of supervisors. Election precinct lines are required to be drawn to include as a priority public elementary, middle and high schools within an election precinct. School principals are no longer authorized to deny a request to provide space for use as a polling place. A driver license applicant is required to submit proof of identity by presenting all of the following documentation: an original or certified copy of a U.S. passport or birth certificate, proof of a social security number by presenting an original or copy of a social security card or W-2 form, and proof of residency in Arizona in two forms, such as a utility bill or bank statement. The list of satisfactory proof of U.S. citizenship that the county recorder may accept for voter registration is expanded to include an identification card issued by Arizona or the U.S. Due to voter protection, several sections of this legislation require the affirmative vote of at least 3/4 of the members of each house of the Legislature for passage.

The Legislature is permitted to take this action without regard to whether the Legislature is in regular or special session or has held committee or other hearings on the matter. Any party to an election contest may request a jury trial, which must be granted and tried as other jury trials in a civil action, except that the statutory provisions for election contests prevail over any conflicting rules of procedure for jury trials. In an election contest jury trial, a court is prohibited from granting a motion to dismiss or a motion for summary judgment that would result in dismissal until after the jury has issued its verdict. Without regard to the system or method used to produce or tabulate ballots, the county recorder or officer in charge of elections is required to maintain a count of the number of physical ballots printed and the number of ballots otherwise generated in the following categories: early ballots, regular ballots, provisional ballots, federal-only ballots, and ballots generated in an electronic form. The county recorder or officer in charge of elections is required to post

that information on the county's website within one day after election day. The county recorder or officer in charge of elections is required to create digitized images of ballots and to keep the digitized images and the physical ballots as public records. At least ten persons from the general public who are registered voters in the county are allowed to observe the proceedings at the counting center at any time throughout the day. All observers must be allowed to observe each essential part of the proceedings at the counting center. When ballots are damaged or defective and cannot be counted by the automatic tabulating equipment, the images that are made of a duplicate of those ballots must be posted to the county's website within 24 hours after duplication along with the determination by the election board as to that voter's intent for each contest adjudicated. Any disruption in live video coverage of the custody of all ballots while the ballots are present in a tabulation room in the counting center will result in the members of the board of supervisors and the county recorder being deemed ineligible for reelection and barred from holding any public office in Arizona for ten years after the expiration of the term of office in which the disruption in video coverage occurred. RE: SB 1334 fireworks; aerial devices: AN ACT AMENDING SECTIONS 36-1601 AND 36-1605, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; RELATING TO FIREWORKS.

Honorable Senate Members:

As President of the Arizona Fire Marshals Association, I am writing to urge you to oppose SB 1334 which would expand the types of permissible consumer fireworks, to include multiple tube aerial devices. As written, this bill would increase the potential for injury to the public with the addition of aerial type devices. National organizations such as the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the National Safety Council (NSC) oppose the use of fireworks at any level, by the general public due to injuries. This bill, as written, would add a type of firework, specifically an aerial type that not only increases the risk of injury but the risk of fire to our precious wild lands, structures, and property as well.

Since 1982, the Arizona Fire Marshals Association has been committed to the protection of life and property through education, fire code development and administration for the approximately 200 fire districts and fire departments in the state, as well as the communities they serve. Our membership is represented by fire code professionals from all 15 Arizona counties.

Despite great efforts by fire and life safety code development and education professionals nationally, there has not been a reduction in the number of fireworks injuries over the past several years. According to the 2018 Fireworks Annual Report, published in June 2019 by Yongline Tu and Jason Ng for the Consumer Product Safety Commission, the number of people injured by fireworks was estimated at 9,100. Sixty-two percent of these injuries occurred between June 22 and July 22 of 2018. An estimated 19,500 fires were started by fireworks in 2018, resulting in \$105 million in direct property damage and five civilian deaths that occurred in the 1,755 structure fires. These structure fires accounted for 45% of the property damage loss.

In 2020, the restrictions for public assembly caused by the COVID-19 pandemic resulted in the cancellation of many special events, including professional fireworks shows. I am witness to the fact that many individuals chose to have their own private fireworks celebrations, which included aerial fireworks not currently legal but may be allowed should this Bill pass. According to media reports and police records, it would appear that many state residents have found themselves next door to such events, maybe even cleaning aerial fireworks off of their roofs and out of their own backyard pools every weekend. A January 5, 2021 interview with Phoenix Councilmember Debra Stark revealed an increase in illegal, including aerial, fireworks use that has resulted in a petition to ban consumer fireworks all together (www.change.org).

Law enforcement officers know that aerial fireworks are illegal, and if they are fortunate to arrive at a location where they are being used, they have greater ability to proceed with enforcement action. However, the proposed bill would limit what little enforcement ability these resource strapped agencies have. Legalizing any aerial fireworks would make it extremely difficult for officers to determine legality. It may even change dispatch protocols as dispatchers ask if the fireworks are aerial or not when a complaint call is made to determine if sending an officer is a priority.

The passing of SB1334 will undoubtedly result in an increase in fireworks related, burns, injuries, fires and death. It will further limit the ability for law enforcement to stop the use of illegal fireworks. It will reduce the safety of neighborhoods, both rural and urban and increase the threat to our wild land areas. Thank you for your time and consideration of this request to oppose SB 1334. Meetings, Trainings & Events Attended for the Month

Manager Painter attended the weekly direct reports staff meetings with Chief Karrer and his direct reports, as well as, the Fire Chief's status meeting with all of the managers.

Manager Painter, Administrative (Admin) Assistant Hernandez, Administrative (Admin) Specialist Ramos and Records Specialist (RS) Ortiz attended the weekly Board Services meetings. Admin Specialist Ramos attended meetings with vendors and chiefs regarding District projects.

Manager Painter attended multiple meetings (through teleconference) for the Arizona Municipal Clerks Association including: the communications committee, education committee, annual conference sub-committee, Athenian dialogue sub-committee, and best practices sub-committee.

IT Applications Group Activities/Projects

The GRFD IT Applications group has been working on the following projects:

- The application group continues to focus on the new staffing program by Kronos, Workforce TeleStaff. TeleStaff optimizes the scheduling, communications, and deployment of public safety personnel. We are currently finalized several components to make it work with our current fire record system and send text messages. Also, we have performed a mass import of personnel data into Telestaff in support of testing and preparation for the upcoming go-live date. This allowed the scheduling admins to perform more in-depth testing of the system to ensure text messaging and shift alerts work as expected when we go live on the new software.
- The applications group has completed the updated our finance software Abila. The Abila upgrade allowing the finance department to utilize the latest forms and features.
- Recently we have been looking to standardize our way of creating files, sharing them internally or externally, or being able to collaborate with other people. We have looked into many platforms to accomplish our needs, and we have agreed to continue with OneDrive. OneDrive is the cloud storage service developed by Microsoft that allows you to store all your important files securely in one place and then access them virtually anywhere. The service works similarly to a traditional hard drive, but it's available through the internet with additional features. For instance, because of its cross-device and cross-platform design, you can create a file on one device and pick up where you left off on your laptop, tablet, or phone without having to save a copy on a USB flash drive or email it to yourself. Also, OneDrive makes it easy to share content with other people and collaborate in real-time. So far we are still in the testing stage, but we believe that we will be deploying this shortly.
- The systems group is currently migrating virtual machines from old servers to the new servers we purchased last year. This benefits the district by having all our services and resources on the best and reliable hardware. In conclusion, the new servers we ordered have been tested and have proved to be better than our previous servers, allowing for easier management of systems.
- The Ruckus wireless project is now complete on the training grounds at the 370 campus. This system can allow all the training grounds to have access to the GRFDAdmin and GRFDPublic Wi-Fi. We hope to use this capability to increase support for electronic applications during the upcoming academy. An application like Zoom video conferencing and electronic checkoff of skills/tasks will elevate or training to the next level.
- We have completed upgrading our domain environment to 2016, this will allow us uses new
 features for managing users and computers in the future. End-users and services were not be
 impacted during a system upgrade.

Finance

ASRS vs. PSPRS

Agent Multiple-Employer Plans vs. Cost Sharing Plans

What is the fundamental difference between ASRS and PSPRS?

A *cost-sharing multiple-employer plan* is one in which the participating government employers pool their assets and their obligations to provide defined benefit pensions—meaning that plan assets can be used to pay the pensions of the retirees of any participating employer.

By contrast, the assets of the participating government employers in an *agent multiple-employer plan* are pooled for investment purposes but separate accounts are maintained for each individual employer. Governments participating in cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans are referred to as cost-sharing employers. In the case of PSPRS, all employers be they municipalities or Fire Districts or the State of Arizona its self, all have their own individual rates and funding levels established by actuaries.

Assistant Chief's Activities for the Month

Meetings attended & general information

- I attended the Fire Chief's direct reports meetings on Mondays.
- I attended the monthly Chief's Status meeting with all managers and division heads.
- I conducted weekly Logistics meetings with direct reports.
- Zoom meetings and phone calls were conducted to coordinate with the Arizona Fire Chiefs
 Association (AFCA) on progress, issues, and concerns from our respective counties on items
 such as AZ Statewide Mutual Aid, COVID-19, and operational needs.
- I continued to work with the Arizona State Local Assistance State Team (LAST). There were no responses to any Line of Duty Deaths (LODD) this past month here in Pima County.
- I continued to work with IMPACT of Southern Arizona. We had been working on developing a new mission statement and strategic plan for the organization for which we now have a new mission statement and strategic plan in place. This great organization does so much for the community. The community partnership between GRFD and IMPACT over the years has been wonderful.
- I worked on the fiscal year 2021-2022 budget process to prepare for the budget study session.
- I did training through Target Solutions and took an EMS Skills Lab class as part of the process to meet my EMT state recertification requirements.
- I attended a "meet and greet" zoom event with our new academy recruits and their families, coordinated through the Training division. The event gave the recruits and their families an opportunity to visit and discuss the academy process and expectations, as well as ask questions to senior staff members. Not an ideal way to meet and greet but it was nice hearing from the recruits and their families.
- Command staff spoke to the recruits on day one of the academy. We shared our background,
 words of encouragement, expectations, and insight related to GRFD and career as a firefighter.

- Command staff continued to work with senior leadership of the Robson Communities to determine the exact station site locations for station 378. We have anticipated three acres that will be to the east of the main entrance to the SaddleBrooke Ranch Community. The architect, WSM, created a sketch/preliminary design of the station with site needs. It will mirror our current station 379 with the addition of a helipad and possible radio tower for the Robson team to determine the best location for the station site. WSM will submit the sketch to GRFD and Robson team for review.
- I continued to work with Core Construction and WSM Architects in reference to the station 374
 decontamination room, turnout room expansion, and other related modifications in the station
 bay.
- The remodels of the north administration lobby on Golder Ranch Drive and the Fire & Life Safety lobby on Magee have been completed. The furniture was installed and personnel have been working to get their offices and lobby area back to normal. The furniture looks great. See photos below.









Our solar project is off and running. The solar system install began at station 379 on Shannon and Overton. The next station will be station 380 on Magee Rd and, finally, the station 370 campus on Golder Ranch Drive near Fleet and behind Administration will be done. 
- We continued discussion about the scope of work on the turnout room at station 374 with CORE Construction and WSM architects.

• The Apparatus Committee is nearing the final inspection point on the 4x4 engine. We have anticipated late March or early April for the inspection trip.



Procurement/Communications Specialist

• The District was one of the successful recipients under the 2019 Assistance to Firefighters Grant for dual-band radios (800-PCWIN / VHF). Along with a multitude of other area departments, including Tucson Fire Department (TFD) and Northwest Fire District (NWFD), GRFD received their requested amount of dual-band mobile radios. We requested and received 38 radios in all. The District's portion for these radios was \$17,572 or 10% of cost. This a great and needed addition as many vehicles do not currently have Pima County Wireless Integrated Network (PCWIN) radios, or had been using single-band radios that had been loaned to us by PCWIN. This will allow all Pima County agencies enhanced communication capabilities, particularly for VHF communications, which is widely used at the state and federal levels (not on PCWIN).

Deputy Chief Fire/Emergency Services Activities for the Month

- First couple weeks covering Deputy Chief Hurguy's position along with my own have been quite a whirlwind. Below are a few high level topics this month that I would like to share with the board.
- I attended a Regional Operations Committee meeting with Tucson Fire Department (TFD) and Northwest Fire Chiefs. This committee was previously attended by Deputy Chief Hurguy and I'm looking forward to representing Golder Ranch. We have a lot of opportunity coming up to expand our auto aid capabilities as a region, especially with TFD moving to a 3x4 schedule to mirror ours. Having a consistent battalion chief counterpart, along with engine captains is essential to building better relationships prior to the fire calls.

- I needed to create a sustainable plan on visiting stations and staying engaged with our crews. I have started an end of day "fitness meeting" two days per week and started building out the schedule. How it works is around 3pm I show up in PT gear at one of our stations and I do whatever workout the crew has planned for the day. After the workout we chat about life, district issues and whatever else may come up. So far it has been great working out with them and bridging the gap between administration and suppression. I need to stay healthy and active anyway, so it works out great! I'll keep you posted.
- The chief officers and I have all come together to assist training in building a Captain Promotional Process. Sounds like when the application deadline closes we will have 10-14 candidates, which is great! This will be logistically challenging with the academy going on, but we'll get creative and put out a great product.
- I have a lot to learn on the budget and finance side of things, and so far Dave Christian and
 our budget gang have been great. We came together to figure out a plan to reduce overtime
 and so far it is off to a good start. The crews in the field have been understanding of our
 overall mission, and an explanation of the "why" disseminated by our chief officers has gone a
 long way.
- Lastly, I am developing an enhancement to our communications repertoire in our Leadership Lab in the 380 classroom. These days, YouTube teaches us just about everything via "explainer videos". I am going to try one out with our recent plan of restructuring our task books, building a more efficient career progression path and eliminating the Fire Medic position. 

 - o Lastly the completed an After Action Report





BACKGROUND

Succession planning for the future has been a very high priority for me, at the direction of the District governing board. The Golder Ranch Fire District has grown significantly in the last ten years in terms of assessed value, revenue, geographic boundary and personnel. This is largely due to the consolidation with Mountain Vista Fire District and continued annexations in the Oro Valley area. Growth of any organization requires an intentional philosophical approach to succession planning to prepare personnel to fill vacancies. With the pending retirement of an assistant chief and the fire chief in 2 years, providing opportunity for direct internal coaching, mentoring, and guidance to include on the job training is extremely important for the preparation of our personnel. As you know I have been re-evaluating our current reporting structure and assessing the needs of the organization. As such, I find the need to make additional adjustments.

Therefore I respectfully request the board authorize the reclassification of a Division Chief position to an Assistant Chief position. This would be a \$5000 impact which can be absorb utilizing contingency funds. This Assistant Chief position will be a critical position that would allow direct strategic guidance into the future of the organization. This will also provide a unique and very necessary opportunity for training and mentoring as well as this will also allow for the progression of multiple individuals in the chain of command. Upon retirement of the Assistant Chief position in 2023, the board can determine at that time if that position should be filled.
