8. REPORTS AND CORRESPONDENCE

A. FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT – Chief Karrer presented the fire chief's report to the Governing Board. Chief Karrer added that he was very proud of the CAAS accreditation that the District received and that it is a big deal. He said Chief Robb would report on that later. Clerk Vette asked for an update regarding the property for station 378 new build. Chief Karrer reported that they have settled on a 2-acre lot, that is state land and that Chiefs Abel and Miller are proceeding to work with the state to apply to begin negotiations with the state to purchase the property. Golder Ranch will purchase with bond funds and Robson will reimburse the District. He also noted that there are no plans for a heliport at this time.

Vice Chair Hudgins asked about the dedication for station 375. Chief Karrer reported that they were thinking of having a more in-person gathering instead of virtual since things have opened up more. They will work on planning the event and report back. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.

- BOARD SERVICES REPORT Administrative Assistant Ramos presented the Board Services Report on behalf of Manager Painter. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.
- COMMUNITY RELATIONS REPORT Captain Jarrold presented the Community Relations report on behalf of Manager Braswell. He added that there was a blood drive going on in the parking lot of station 380 at that same time. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.
- LEADERSHIP TEAM REPORT President Jones reported that unless there were questions from the Board, he would wait to speak until the agenda item for the MOU was presented. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.
- B. LOGISTICS/PLANNING ASSISTANT CHIEF'S REPORT Chief Abel presented the Logistics/Planning Assistant Chief's report to the Governing Board. Chief Abel added that the new pumper truck is here and parked out front. He also reported that they received approval from the HOA for station 374 project and they are submitting plans for permits. He reported the ongoing process for the administration building and the campus. They are working on a three-phase plan, which includes commercial property, land, and expanding here on the current property. Chairperson Cox Golder asked which realtor they were working with. Chief Abel responded Swain Chapman. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.



- C. BUSINESS/GOVERNMENTAL/PERSONNEL ASSISTANT CHIEF'S REPORT Human Resources Manager Allison DeLong presented the Business/ Governmental/ Personnel Assistant Chief's report on behalf of Chief Brandhuber. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.
- D. OPERATIONS ASSISTANT CHIEF'S REPORT Chief Robb presented the Operations Assistant Chief's Report to the Governing Board. Chief Robb added that our operational priorities this month are all the heat challenges we are having across the region. He said that the battalion chiefs are on top of it and creating shorter work rest cycles, prioritizing hydration, and getting a good balance so we can stay trained and continue to be effective when we have to go on a call or respond to a fire. Chairperson Cox Golder asked if we are getting many heat related calls. Chief Robb responded so far not many, luckily. We had one hiker recently, but other than that, no.

Board Member Brady asked about our award. Chief Robb reported that we did officially receive our CAAS notice and our certificate. He stated that so much of the credit should go to Chief Brandhuber. Chief Robb went on that this really was Chief Brandhuber's vision. We have certification for three years. Board Member Pesqueira commented that this is fantastic. He asked what the timelines for staff to review our processes are to make sure that we are staying on top of it to maintain certification and do what we say we are going to do. Chief Robb responded that he is working with Chief Pearce and the EMS division on quarterly reviews.

Clerk Vette offered congratulations for having no deficiencies during the accreditation and said that was amazing. Chief Karrer said it was important to note there are only four agencies in the state and we are the only fire department in the state that have this accreditation.

Clerk Vette asked where the swift water training was that was in the report because he has not seen that much water in a long time. Chief Robb responded that it is usually at the Gila River in March or April when they have the shot at having enough water to simulate swift water rescue. There were no further questions or comment from the Governing Board.

Finance Manager Christian presented a report regarding the IGA for ambulance billing service and explained that for whatever reason our IGA was never formally adopted. It is the same agreement we have with other fire districts that we work with for ambulance billing. Chief Karrer explained that Mt. Lemmon is a little different and did not have a CON prior and so it was mostly emergency rescue but they now have a CON and that is why we want to formalize it. Board Member Pesqueira asked how they came to the 10% service fee. Manager Christian responded saying they based on the fact that they have such a low volume, 10% seemed appropriate compensation based on costs associated for setting up billing within our software and managing it. Vice-Chair Hudgins asked what other fire districts pay. Manager Christian responded they are at 6% but have higher volume. Chairperson Cox Golder asked how we know when there are transports. Manager Christian responded that all dispatches go out through the CAD system then the patient care report comes back to us electronically. We also have our automated EPCR system that our IT division set up. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.

Chief Karrer invited President Ben Jones up to assist in presenting the MOU. Chief Karrer made comments on the MOU. He referred to changes to the format, stipends for Special Teams for more discussion, and the uniform policy.

President Jones spoke about the format of the MOU and the length of the document. Vice-Chair Hudgins asked if all costs are in the current budget. Chief Karrer responded yes. Board Member Pesqueira asked if the PTO policy was staying the same. Chief Karrer noted that the only thing that changed, based upon legal advice, was the 400 hours for union business. Chairperson Cox Golder asked if they were both satisfied with the MOU. Both Chief Karrer and President Jones responded that they were satisfied



with the MOU. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.

Assistant Chief Scott Robb responded saying we really do a great job with our captains in the field by bringing things up through the chain of command. We stay consistent by bringing those issues through the chain of command, through the chief officers, and working with Human Resources (HR). Chief Robb added that HR has a fine database that we can draw on, bringing it all forward through the process helps to ensure that we are keeping it consistent. There were no further questions or comments from the Governing Board.

June 2021

Meetings, Trainings & Events Attended for the Month

I conducted the monthly Fire Chief's Status meeting with all managers and division heads.

I conducted the Executive Staff meetings with my direct reports. We discussed the construction projects as well as existing properties of interest for possible expansion. We evaluated multiple options to bring to the Governing Board.

We conducted the monthly governing board meeting via Zoom. We amended the agenda for the meeting at the request of our attorney, Donna Aversa. She requested the Board to adopt a formal policy of who can be "served" on behalf of the District for legal matters. This was brought to the forefront in anticipation of a formal legal claim to be filed against the District as a result of the accident with Medic 373 in December of last year. Other items of interest included four promotions to Captain, one retirement, multiple policies, and the approval of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Local 3832.

I attended the Local Pension Board meeting. We approved several retirements and independent medical exams (IMEs) for medical retirees.

I participated in the Leadership Team meeting. We worked to complete the MOU in anticipation of July 1, 2021. The Leadership Team unanimously agreed to table the discussion of Special Teams' stipends in an effort to fully engage work groups from both teams to clarify the needs and expectations. This was following months of discussion with team members who would be impacted. Many team members provided a variety of other thoughtful ideas and perspectives that had not been previously considered. Essentially, the Leadership Team felt the need to fully examine and consider the ideas brought forward, which could not occur prior to the July 1, 2021 deadline. Therefore, meetings with the individual teams were scheduled in order to create working groups to develop comprehensive programs for the next MOU discussions.

Leadership President Jones and I met with the Wildland Team to discuss the working group for stipends that was requested in the MOU. We also met with the Special Ops Team at station 377.

I attended the monthly Operations Team meeting with all the battalion and division chiefs.

Chief Robb and I addressed the Academy class to provide inspiration and motivation as they prepared to take their state firefighter exam, which is an intensive process. I was confident that the class was prepared to not only be successful, but to knock it out of the park.

The assistant chiefs and I attended the Tucson Fire Recruit class graduation.

I attended the Pima County Fire Chiefs meeting hosted by Golder Ranch Fire District (GRFD) at station 380. Special thanks to Administrative Assistant Christine Leonard and Captain Adam Jarrold for setting up for the meeting and providing the breakfast. Items discussed were:

- The American Rescue Plan working with our legislators to include fire districts in funding opportunities
- La Fiesta De Los Bomberos scheduled for September 17 & 18th at Starr Pass Resort & Spa
- o Creating a seminar hosted by Pima Fire Chiefs on resilience and "life in the fire service"
- o Overview of a meeting with Chuck Huckelberry
- o The writing of a letter opposing the 20% increase by Tucson Water for unincorporated Pima County

I attended the Arizona Fire Districts Association (AFDA) meeting virtually.

I attended a Zoom meeting with the executive leadership of AFDA and the Arizona Fire Chiefs Association (AFCA). We met to prepare for a meeting with the Department of Health Services Bureau's Chief Garcia in reference to how automatic aid functions as related to ambulance response.

I attended the Baggers conference in Glendale, Arizona. Baggers is a group of fire chiefs from around the country that gather twice a year to discuss current events, trends, and issues in the fire service. This invitation-only group has not met in over a year because of COVID. It was nice to reconvene.

I attended the State Mutual Aid meeting virtually with the Arizona Division of Emergency Management (ADEM) and the Governor's office.

I attended the Oro Valley Council meetings virtually. The Council passed (6-0) the tentative budget of \$161 million as well as a resolution to address the unfunded liability in Public Safety Retirement System (PSPRS), similar to what we have done recently with our Certificate of Participation (COP) process. Later in the month while in Glendale (have to love technology), I attended the Oro Valley Council meeting via Zoom. Of interest on that meeting's agenda was the request for approval of revised architecture for development of the La Posada Senior Living Facility, located on the southeast corner of Naranja Drive and 1st Avenue. This was previously on the agenda for the Town of Oro Valley in 2016 and was known as the Nakoma Sky project. It was basically stalled at that time for many reasons. However, it has returned and the architectural plans have changed a bit. The plan was approved by the Council. We had been heavily involved in this project early on because of the potential to impact our call volume.

I traveled to Phoenix with Chief Bradley from Northwest Fire District (NWFD) to attend the Securis (workers' compensation pool) board meeting. Items discussed included the impact of the presumptive cancer legislation, the impact of large claims, and proactive preventative safety measures to reduce large claims.

I attended a planning session for the Giampa memorial service. There were several difficult details to work through.

Additionally, I spent much of my time catching up on work and touching base with personnel at various work locations.

I participated in a Teams video meeting regarding the upcoming monsoon season and the impact it may have on the burn area of the Bighorn Fire. We will likely see the flooding in the Catalina area and possibly in some areas of Oro Valley. Pima County flood control has been reaching out to areas they anticipate to be impacted. These also include the areas where the

major drainage washes come together and other low lying areas. As little as ½ inch of rain could be problematic. We have been working with our partners at Oro Valley and Pima County to do our best to prepare. Although not much rain has fallen as of yet, we have already seen some flooding and debris is various areas.

The State of Arizona Division of Forestry and Fire Management (DFFM) closed all state lands due to fire concerns. Many national forests in Arizona have also been closed, although, as of this writing, the Coronado National Forest has not.

About 5-6 people contacted us with concerns about the firework shows in SaddleBrooke and Oro Valley on July 4th. Both of these events were scheduled to have professional companies responsible for shooting that followed the adopted fire code and we scheduled "standbys" for both events.

District Activities for the Month

Attached you will find the press release announcing our CAAS Accreditation! Again, I am extremely proud of our GRFD personnel.

I met with Battalion Chief Taylor to provide direction and to receive updates on our uniform process. It has continued to be difficult to get uniforms because of extended wait times. COVID played a role as far as supply, however, we have still been seeing delays. With the adjustment in uniform allowance, we have been evaluating a change in our internal uniform procedure to simplify the process.

Much of my time was spent on the MOU with the Local 3832. I attended the Special Ops Team meeting at station 377 to discuss the working group for stipends that was requested in the MOU. The Special Teams' stipends were the primary discussion. I personally met with multiple members of the Wildland Team. Following the meetings with both special teams, I anticipated significant structural changes would be made on how the teams function to include better defining of expectations and qualifications of each team. The team members were empowered to develop proposals that outline expectations and qualifications for both teams. This will be especially important as we begin to expand our automatic aid responses and we see more opportunity for campaign fires or out-of-district responses. I had a long conference call with District Attorney Aversa regarding the MOU. She spent a significant amount of time reviewing this new format and made multiple adjustments to the document. The document was then proofread for punctuation and grammar and placed on the monthly board meeting's agenda (as previously described).

I worked with Division Chief Pearce on policies that were placed on the June board meeting's agenda. The Lexipol (policy consultant) project has been moving along quickly and I anticipate that the Board will see 10-15 policies/month for the foreseeable future until completed. This has been a huge undertaking, but will ensure we are compliant with state and federal laws, not to mention provide consistency to our personnel.

I spent multiple days working on the Strategic Plan. Although it was completed by the consultants, we have been making adjustments to the formatting so we can track our progress on the plan electronically. We have not changed content, rather ensured proper terminology, punctuation, and the ability to make this a living electronic document. It was not presented at the June board meeting, but will be presented in July.

Our finance department delivered budget books to all the managers and we began the 2021-2022 budget!

We distributed tuition reimbursement checks to those who submitted requests. This is such a wonderful benefit for the people of GRFD as we promote higher education with financial assistance. Thank you to Manager Painter for managing that program.

Chiefs Brandhuber, Abel, Miller, IT Manager Rascon, and IT Supervisor Martinez walked two proposed lots for station 378 on the main entrance to SaddleBrooke Ranch. We decided on the lot on the east side of the driveway for a variety reasons, including access to the community, availability of utilities, and microwave connection. Later that day we had a call with Vice President Jose Castillo of Robson Communities to confirm that intention. We made a formal

application to State Land for this lot. Hopefully we will be able to move this purchasing process along quickly with State Land so we can begin construction as soon as possible.

Multiple units responded to an active shooting situation with multiple victims in a Catalina residential area. We transported 2 patients with gunshot wounds to the trauma center, with another deceased at the scene. Pima County Sheriff's Department (PCSD) and the regional SWAT team addressed the barricaded suspect that was later found deceased. We opened Classroom 2 at Training for neighbors that were evacuated.

Our Type 3 engine has timed out and returned from the Telegraph Fire. We have had one ambulance on a medical standby at the same fire.

We received a notice of claim for \$4 million as a result of the accident involving Medic 373 on 12/27/20. We submitted this to our insurance company for action. I spent a significant amount of time working with the insurance company, legal counsel, and others compiling information regarding the claim. We received a very large public records request from the plaintiff's attorney. Records Specialist Shannon Ortiz has been working through many documents specific to the incident. I have had multiple conference calls with the claims adjuster to review documentation as the plaintiff attorney has been very active in communication with District Attorney Aversa. I have been advised by the adjuster that a defensive attorney will likely be assigned.

The Academy hosted the Red, White and Blue work out. All members of GRFD were invited to participate. I was bummed that I was unable to attend, as it is a great opportunity to bond with the recruits, although, I would have needed a lot of ibuprofen!

Attached is the recruit class 21-01 graduation invitation. We conducted rehearsal the day before the event. The graduation ceremony was a wonderful celebration memorializing the impressive achievement of these 21 new GRFD family members!

Personnel Updates

I met with HR and Operations regarding adjustments in operations. Two captains were promoted and two division chiefs were promoted to fill vacancies. Please follow these links: Regular Memo 21-036 Captain Promotions and Regular Memo 21-037 Deputy Chief Appointments. Other adjustments in Operations will be forthcoming as we return to full

staffing and we strive to meet the operational objectives. I delivered a Captains helmet to new Captain Sean Sicurello at station 379 and new Captain Nick Boone at station 373!

GRFD Captain Lucas Giampa was injured in an early morning motorcycle crash on the south side. Upon notification, Chief Pearce immediately responded to Banner UMC to assess the seriousness of his injuries. I joined him shortly after and we spent the afternoon in the ICU waiting room with the family and friends until his passing in the late afternoon. At that point, appropriate notifications were made and I called an emergency Command Staff meeting. Following the meeting, I went to station 379 to meet with Captain Giampa's crew that was on duty that day. The attached emails and press releases went out following his passing, along with significant media coverage. The Arizona Local Assistance State Team (LAST), through AFCA, was requested to assist in the funeral planning. GRFD Captain Mike Thomas is the lead for the planning process and Captain John Spanarella was assigned as the family liaison. Services have been planned for July 13th at Casas Church in Oro Valley.

I conducted a Zoom meeting with the entire organization regarding the passing of Captain Giampa. This was a time to share information, what we knew at that time, and what we did not know. The remainder of the day was spent visiting all divisions, stations, checking on people and organizing the logistics of the massive task in front of us. HR Manager Delong and HR Generalist Metzger were a HUGE help as we dealt with many issues to assist the family in their time of grief. These included, but were not limited to, distribution of funds to the beneficiary, PSPRS notification, and benefit issues, etc. Additionally, I worked with President Jones from the Local 3832 regarding all aspects of this very unfortunate event. The teamwork exhibited by the Local's executive board and membership has been exceptional. Truly, we have been working together in support of the family and the GRFD fire family! Although very tragic and sad, seeing the true dedication to each other has been wonderful!

Dee Brady, wife of long-time GRFD Board Member, Steve Brady, passed away. Dee was a caring person that was very engaged with the people of Golder Ranch Fire District, often referring to them as her "kids" or "grandkids." Mr. Brady has been doing as well as can be expected during this time. Both his daughters have been with him, providing love and support. Services are still pending at this time.

Today is the 169th day of the legislative session. Late last week the House passed a majority of the FY22 budget reconciliation bills (BRBs'). Several of the BRBs' were amended in the House (criminal justice, K-12) and will have to return to the Senate for action. The tax BRB, S1828: OMNIBUS, TAXATION passed out of the House on a party-line 31-29 vote count. The amended version of S1828 includes provisions to hold cities and towns harmless concerning state shared revenues under the income flat tax. Municipal revenue sharing will increase from 15% to 18% under the FY22 budget plan. S1828 includes the two-step tax rate cap adjustment for fire districts (3.25-3.37-3.50) and corresponding Class 1 tax assessment ratio reductions (commercial property). The Senate's final language lowered the commercial tax assessment ratio from 18% to 16% in increments of a half-percent annually over the next four tax years (TY2022 – TY2025). Fire district tax rate cap adjustments will begin July 1, 2022 (FY22/23 = 3.375 and FY23/24 = 3.50). S1828 was substituted in the House for identical H2900 and now awaits the Governor's signature.

Listed below is a summary of fire service items included in the adopted BRBs' for the state's FY22 budget.

- 1. **FIRE DISTRICTS FINAL FY22 BUDGET ITEMS** (appropriations and policy impacting fire districts)
 - Tax Policy: Tax rate cap adjustment (3.25 to 3.37 to 3.50 over two years) with corresponding tax assessment ratio reduction (PASSED S1828 awaiting Governor)
 - Appropriation: Transwestern pipeline tax settlement reimbursement for impacted fire districts (PASSED \$17 million)
 - Appropriation: Reimbursement Fund for small agencies EMS response on federal land (PASSED S1822 awaiting Governor \$2.5 million non lapsing)
- 2. **MUNICIPAL FIRE SERVICES FINAL FY22 BUDGET ITEMS** (appropriations and policy impacting municipal fire services)
 - Tax Policy: Hold harmless on state shared revenues for cities and towns for income tax reduction (PASSED S1828 awaiting Governor)
 - Appropriation: \$20 million dollar funding transfer for the municipal risk pool for firefighter cancer claims (PASSED awaiting Governor)
- 3. **STATEWIDE FIRE SERVICE FINAL FY22 BUDGET ITEMS** (appropriations with statewide impact)
 - Appropriation: Funding for Dept. Forestry and Fire Management (PASSED awaiting Governor additional \$3.8 million one-time funding to fire suppression fund)
 - Appropriation: Funding for State Fire Marshal's Office (PASSED awaiting Governor adding 4 FTE)
 - Appropriation: State Fire School subsidy (PASSED awaiting Governor \$275,300 in funding)
 - Appropriation: Hazardous Vegetation Removal program (PASSED in SPECIAL SESSION APPROPRIATION -\$18 million across various accounts)
 - Appropriation: State Lake Improvement funding and fire / rescue boat grants (PASSED awaiting Governor – \$4.0 million – non lapsing)

The Senate and House are scheduled to convene today at 11:00 a.m. to take action on the remaining BRBs' and several other remaining bills. Assuming the Senate and House majority can come to agreement on the remaining issues, this should be the final week of the legislative session. Floor calendars for COW, Third Read and Final Read post daily: House & Senate Floor Calendars. Floor sessions can be livestreamed here: Az Legislative Livestream.

To date a total of 1,774 bills have been introduced, with 429 of those bills having passed out of both the Senate and House. The Governor has signed 381 bills into law and vetoed 27 bills. The week's Fire Service Bill Tracking Report is attached, which details 61 fire service bills of interest and those bills impacting fire district administration and governance. Primary fire service bills of interest are listed below with the last action and next action noted. NOTE: Legislation enacted into law takes effect 90 days post adjournment sine die unless passed with an emergency clause or specified effective date.

Fire investigators are added to the presumption that specified types of cancer and related diseases that result in disability or death are an occupational disease and are deemed to arise out of employment if specified conditions are met. All insurance carriers, self-insuring employers and workers' compensation pools that secure workers' compensation for firefighters and fire investigators are required to compile and report to the Industrial Commission claim and claim reserve information for all cancer-related claims filed by or on behalf of firefighters and fire investigators. The Commission is required to compile and make available to insurance carriers, rating organizations, employers, public safety workers and workers' compensation pools the claim-related information collected to assist with the setting of workers' compensation insurance rates. In addition to the six uniform percentage deviations already authorized by statute, insurers covering firefighters and fire investigators are permitted to file one uniform percentage deviation that increases the statewide rates under the rating organization's rate filing for the class codes associated with firefighters and fire investigators to address the anticipated increase in losses and expenses for claims that are compensable due to the workers' compensation presumption. Fire district boards are required to obtain from a licensed or certified appraiser an appraisal of real property owned by the district to determine market value, and are prohibited from accepting a bid for the sale of that property that is less than 75 percent of the appraised market value. If the property has no market value or a net value of \$10,000 or less, the board is authorized to value the property by using a market analysis based on comparable sales. The board is allowed to sell or lease fire district property to any other governmental entity on any terms deemed to be advantageous to the fire district. S1373: HEALTH FACILITIES; DUTY OF CARE

Licensed health care institutions that provide residential care and the institution's employees and agents have an affirmative duty of care for their residents. These institutions are required to initiate cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), in accordance with that resident's advance directives and do-not-resuscitate order, to a resident who is nonresponsive or has a cessation of respiration, and are required to provide appropriate first aid to a resident who is in distress or who has fallen and is unable to reasonably recover independently. These institutions are prohibited from implementing policies that prevent employees from providing appropriate CPR or first aid to the institution's residents. Health care institutions and staff members who render CPR or first aid according to these requirements are not liable for civil damages as a result of any act or omission by the person rendering care, if the care is rendered in good faith and consistent with CPR or first aid certification standards. To implement the program to remove vegetative natural products where the vegetation is hazardous, the State Forester is authorized to enter into an intergovernmental agreement or memorandum of understanding with a "public agency" (defined elsewhere in statute) to identify and remove the hazardous vegetation from land in this state, including state, federal, tribal and private lands for the purposes of fire prevention, forest and watershed restoration and critical infrastructure protection. Does not apply to State Trust Land. The State Forester is authorized to use legislative appropriations and accept and spend monies from public agencies, gifts, donations and grants for the costs of implementing this legislation. The consent of the property owner is required to remove hazardous vegetation on private property, and the consent of the Tribe is required to remove hazardous vegetation on tribal land. The Commission is required to compile and make available to insurance carriers, rating organizations, employers, public safety workers and workers' compensation pools the claim-related information collected to assist with the setting of workers' compensation insurance rates. In addition to the six uniform percentage deviations already authorized by statute, insurers covering firefighters and fire investigators are permitted to file one uniform percentage deviation that increases the statewide rates under the rating organization's rate filing for the class codes associated with firefighters and fire investigators to address the anticipated increase in losses and expenses for claims that are compensable due to the workers' compensation presumption. A person who is not licensed and who practices or attempts to practice or who holds himself out as trained and authorized to practice behavioral health, including diagnosing or treating any mental ailment, disease, disorder or other mental condition of any person, without being authorized by law to perform the act, is engaging in the unauthorized practice of behavioral health, is guilty of a class 6 (lowest) felony, and is subject to a civil penalty of up to \$500 for each offense. A person who conspires with or aids and abets another to commit any act constituting the unauthorized practice of behavioral health is guilty of a class 6 (lowest) felony and is subject to a civil penalty of up to \$500 for each offense. The Board of Behavioral Health Examiners is required to notify the Department of Health Services if a licensed health care institution employs or contracts with a person who is investigated for the unauthorized practice of behavioral health. Also modifies the post-master's degree experience or post-bachelor's degree experience requirements for licensed clinical social workers, licensed professional counselors, licensed marriage and family therapists, and licensed substance abuse counselors. As a condition for class 2 property tax valuation, the owner of a guest ranch is required to record a deed restriction with the county recorder that restricts the property to use as a quest ranch for at least ten years. The valuation of a quest ranch as class 2 property constitutes a covenant between the county assessor and the owner of the quest ranch that the use of the property will remain unchanged for the duration of the deed restriction. If the property is converted to a different use in violation of the covenant, the county assessor is required to add to the tax levied against the property on the next tax roll a penalty equal to the difference between the total amount of property taxes that would have been levied on the property for the preceding ten years or the period of time the property was valued as class 2 property, whichever period is shorter, if the property had not been valued as class 2 property and the property taxes that were actually paid for the same period. The penalty must be paid before completion of the next property tax roll and is enforceable and subject to the same penalties and interest as if the penalty were a tax levied against the property. Various changes to statutes relating to taxes. The list of additions to Arizona gross income for the purpose of computing Arizona adjusted gross income for individual and corporate income tax purposes is modified to remove the amount of any depreciation allowed by specified federal code. The list of subtractions from Arizona gross income for the purpose of computing Arizona adjusted gross income for income tax purposes is modified to include 50 percent of the net long-term capital gain included in federal adjusted gross income for the tax year that is derived from an investment in an asset acquired after December 31, 2020. Increases the dependent tax credit to \$120 for each dependent who is under 17 years of age, from \$100, and to \$30 for each dependent who is at least 17 years of age, from \$25. Lowers the state equalization assistance property tax rate to \$0.4263 in tax year 2021, \$0.3430 in tax year 2022, and \$0.2745 in tax year 2023, from \$0.4426 in tax year 2020. Lowers the tax rate for class one property taxes to 17.5 percent for tax year 2022 and 17 percent for tax years beginning with 2023, from 18 percent in 2021. The maximum additional tax rate that a county fire district board may levy is increased to \$3.375 per \$100 of assessed valuation for tax year 2022 and \$3.50 per \$100 of assessed valuation for tax year 2023 and each tax year after, from \$3.25 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Retroactive to July 1, 2021, establishes a tax on vehicles propelled only by electricity, natural gas or propane of \$110 per year, and a tax on hybrid vehicles of \$44 per year. Income tax revisions are retroactive to tax years beginning January 1, 2021. AS PASSED SENATE

S1260: PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS; STATUTORY CONFORMITY

Exempts the property of veterans with service or nonservice connected disabilities who are Arizona residents from taxation, with an allowed exemption amount of \$4,117 multiplied by the percentage of the veteran's disability, as rated by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, if the person's total assessment does not exceed \$27,970. The exemption limit for property of widows, widowers and persons with total and permanent disabilities is increased to \$4,117, from \$3,000, if the person's' total assessment does not exceed \$27,970, increased from \$20,000. Also makes various changes to property tax statutes in order to conform to proposed changes to property tax exemptions contained in the state Constitution. All nonresident circulators and paid circulators are required to register as circulators with the Secretary of State before circulating recall petitions, and any signatures collected by a circulator who fails to register as required are disqualified. Establishes requirements for circulator registration. If a registered circulator is properly served with a subpoena to provide evidence in an action regarding circulation of petitions and fails to appear or produce documents as provided for in the subpoena, all signatures collected by that circulator are deemed invalid. Any person may challenge the lawful registration of circulators in the superior court of the county in which the circulator is registered, and deadlines for challenges are specified. Establishes a process for a person who has signed a recall petition to withdraw the person's signature. Specifies that various unlawful acts relating to recall petitions are a class 1 (highest) misdemeanor. Establishes a list of acts that constitute recall petition signature fraud and classifies recall petition signature fraud as a class 1 (highest) misdemeanor, except that a person who engages or participates in a "pattern of recall petition fraud" (defined) is quilty of a class 4 (lower mid-level) felony. County boards of supervisors are required to deliver the canvass to the Secretary of State within 14 days after the primary election, increased from 10 days, and the Secretary of State is required to canvass the return by the third Monday following the primary election, instead of the second Monday following. Tucson, AZ- The Golder Ranch Fire District (GRFD) has successfully been awarded accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Ambulance Services (CAAS). GRFD is the fourth agency accredited in the state of Arizona and the only fire district currently accredited. This distinction assures patients that the service GRFD emergency medical personnel is providing meets the Commission's high standard for quality patient care and ambulance transportation.

"In light of the dynamic and tumultuous year that we all went through as a result of the pandemic, it's a remarkable achievement for our organization. This is a monumental task during normal conditions but in the midst of a global pandemic, it took focus and dedication on the accreditation process; our staff deserves all of the credit," commented Emergency Medical Services Division Chief Grant Cesarek.

The CAAS process involved a yearlong effort on the part of GRFD staff to compile records demonstrating the quality of care provided by our personnel, effectiveness of training, quality improvement process and community risk reduction. After applying for accreditation, the review board completes an initial review followed by two days of interviewing staff at all levels, conducting station and vehicle inspections and reviewing employee files and training records in real time as part of the final review. Manager Painter attended the executive staff meeting with Chief Karrer and his direct reports, as well as, the Fire Chief's status meeting with all of the managers.

Manager Painter, Administrative (Admin) Assistant Hernandez, Administrative (Admin) Specialist Ramos and Records Specialist (RS) Ortiz attended the weekly Board Services meetings. Admin Specialist Ramos attended meetings with vendors and chiefs regarding district projects.

RS Ortiz attended her first Arizona Municipal Clerks Association (AMCA) Academy along with Manager Painter in downtown Phoenix. The classes were held June 15th, 16th, and 17th and covered topics such as Fraud and Internal Controls, Diversity & Inclusion, Power Dynamics, ADA Compliance, Planning vs Strategy, Role of Resolution, Ordinances and Legislative Engagements, Election Signature Challenges and Council Vacancies, and Strategic Advantage of Self-Care. All of the seminars were extremely informational and resourceful. In addition to the content of the training, it was good to see so many old friends and acquaintances and make new ones as well. The networking that takes place at these conferences is just as useful as the content itself.

Manager Painter attended the AMCA Communications Committee Meeting telephonically, as well as the AMCA Executive Board Meeting.

Admin Specialist Ramos assisted Board Services Manager Painter by covering the June Governing Board meeting when she was out of town attending a conference. - The property at 16636 N. Avenida del Oro, also known as, 'Old Fleet,' is still listed under Catalina Volunteer Fire District. Chief Abel asked RS Ortiz to research how to get it listed as Golder Ranch Fire District. RS Ortiz worked with a commercial title officer from Title Security Agency. The draft deed was sent to District Attorney Donna Aversa for review. RS Ortiz was also able to locate the resolution where Golder Ranch Fire District and Catalina Volunteer Fire District merged. This document was used as supporting documentation with the draft deed.
- RS Ortiz continued to create the monthly type count report of the District's statistics
 regarding call load, process and submit data to the National Fire Incident Reporting
 System (NFIRS), assist in posting and distributing regular memos/administrative
 directives, send adopted resolutions to the county recorders to be recorded, conduct
 document searches for previous agreements, resolutions, etc., order office supplies for
 administrative staff, and send out copies of thank you notes/cards to the recipients and
 their supervisors.
- RS Ortiz took the last week of June off to attend her annual family reunion in the White Mountain Lakes as well as celebrate her son's birthday on the 4th of July!

Upon reviewing boxes of old documents, RS Ortiz found a sample ballot from 1986. The
document is attached.

Administrative Assistants' Activities

Administrative Specialist Ramos continued with her daily duties by providing assistance to Board Services, IT and Facilities, and wherever else her assistance was requested. This includes processing invoices for payment, reconciling credit cards, assisting the chiefs with any special projects, and completing other clerical tasks as needed.

- She worked with Logistics to process all invoices for Facilities for payment and close out the 2020/2021 fiscal year. She met with Logistics Chief Hilderbrand and Facilities staff. GOLDER RANCH FIRE DISTRICT EARNS PRESTIGIOUS ACCREDITATION

Tucson, AZ- The Golder Ranch Fire District (GRFD) has successfully been awarded accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Ambulance Services (CAAS). GRFD is the fourth agency accredited in the state of Arizona and the only fire district currently accredited. This distinction assures patients that the service GRFD emergency medical personnel is providing meets the Commission's high standard for quality patient care and ambulance transportation.

"In light of the dynamic and tumultuous year that we all went through as a result of the pandemic, it's a remarkable achievement for our organization. This is a monumental task during normal conditions but in the midst of a global pandemic, it took focus and dedication on the accreditation process; our staff deserves all of the credit," commented Emergency Medical Services Division Chief Grant Cesarek.

The CAAS process involved a yearlong effort on the part of GRFD staff to compile records demonstrating the quality of care provided by our personnel, effectiveness of training, quality improvement process and community risk reduction. After applying for accreditation, the review board completes an initial review followed by two days of interviewing staff at all levels, conducting station and vehicle inspections and reviewing employee files and training records in real time as part of the final review. Due to the pandemic, this review was done virtually.

The accreditation is valid for a period of three years, at the end of the 3-year term; GRFD will participate in another review to renew accreditation.

Assistant Chief's Activities for the Month

Meetings attended & general information

- I attended the Fire Chief's direct reports meetings.
- I attended the monthly Fire Chief's status meeting with all managers and division heads.
- I conducted weekly Logistics meetings with direct reports.
- The Arizona Fire Chiefs Association (AFCA) conducted Zoom meetings and phone calls to discuss statewide mutual aid progress, the AFCA conference in July, and updates and needs.
- I continued to work with the Arizona State Local Assistance State Team (LAST). The Arizona
 State LAST Team has been requested through AFCA to assist us with the funeral service
 planning and management for Captain Lucas Giampa, who recently passed due to a
 motorcycle accident. GRFD Captain Mike Thomas has been leading the planning process.
 Services have been set for July 13th.
- I continued to work with IMPACT of Southern Arizona.
- I completed training through Target Solutions.
- I continued to work with Core Construction and WSM Architects in reference to the station 374 decontamination room, turnout room expansion, and other related modifications in the station bay. Construction documents are being developed and Core is working on providing us a cost for the construction for the station by the first part of month in August. If all goes as planned, I should be able to bring the project GMP (gross maximum price) before the Board for approval at the August board meeting.
- We continued to work with senior leadership of the Robson Communities and have determined
 the exact station site location for Station 378. It will involve purchasing state land property.
 We have started the application process with state land.
- We have been working with both commercial land and commercial building realtors to find a potential new location for our administration offices. We have been looking at all options,

including expansion of our current property. As of this writing, we do have an option that command staff is reviewing as a potential site to the south of our current location.

• Construction will begin on July 6th at station 373 in SaddleBrooke as part of the Security and Ingress/Egress bond project. Station 373 will have security fencing and a secured apparatus gate access system installed to protect GRFD personnel, vehicles, and equipment. The asphalt will be replaced with concrete to improve drive areas and reduce long-term maintenance costs.

I participated in the rehearsal and ceremony for the recruit class Academy 21-01 graduation on
June 25th. It was a wonderful ceremony recognizing the achievement of the 21 recruits as we
welcomed them into the GRFD family.

 We anticipate the grand opening for station 375 on Woodburne Ave to be the third week in August. We have been coordinating internally and with external partners before we finalize the actual date. We will then coordinate with the Board.

Logistics

 Chiefs Abel and Hilderbrand attended the Sun City HOA monthly meeting via Zoom to discuss the turnout room project at station 374. We received a very positive response from the HOA Board and others who attended virtually.

The concrete and security project for station 373 has been awarded. Work is set to begin July 6th and will take approximately one month to complete. Future concrete and security projects will be planned for stations 374, 375, 376, and 377.

• Service Desk (within OPIQ) was used for 116 service requests in June:

o Fleet: 59 requests

o Facilities: 52 requests

o Supply: 15 requests

 The 4x4 engine arrived at GRFD headquarters. Radios have been installed and the striping completed. Wildland crews have been working with Fleet to mount equipment in the appropriate places. It will be on display at the AFCA conference in July.


• The solar project was completed at Administration and station 370. We have still been awaiting Tucson Electric Power (TEP) to allow service to begin.

IT Applications Group Activities/Projects

The GRFD IT Applications group has been working on the following projects:

- Working with the Human Resources Department we have posted for the replacement of our Application Specialist position. This position is part of the team that is responsible for the maintenance and support of all the database-related systems and applications for Golder Ranch Fire District. This person will work with staff and technology representatives of application vendors to develop new reports and processes, in addition to refining existing ones. Additionally, this position assists in resolving application problems for other contracted intergovernmental agencies as needed. This position has wide-ranging responsibilities internally and externally; the incumbent should have a very strong support background.
- We have started the implementation of the new Multifactor authentication (MFA). MFA is a security technology that requires multiple methods of authentication from independent categories of credentials to verify a user's identity for a login or other transaction. Multifactor authentication combines two or more independent credentials. Our goal is to provides an easy-to-use, secure mobile authentication app for quick, push notification-based approval to verify your user's identity with a smartphone, smartwatch, and U2F token support.

IT Systems Group Activities/Projects

The GRFD IT Systems group has been working on the following projects:

• Working with the Human Resources Department we have posted for the replacement of our Systems Specialist position. This position is part of the team responsible for providing IT software, hardware, and network support to all users of the Golder Ranch Fire District and its partners. An individual in this position supports, installs, monitors, troubleshoots, and maintains local area network (LAN) clients, desktop, and server operating systems, and provides on-site or remote assistance to resolve user issues submitted via service requests, phone, email, or in person. This position has wide-ranging responsibilities internally and externally; the incumbent should have a very strong support background.

- We have recently upgraded all the aging Fire Inspectors laptops with the new faster
 Panasonic FZ-55. This model has more memory, a special screen that allows the inspectors
 to use the laptop in the sun without issues to the screen, and also the unit is fully
 ruggedized. This upgrade will provide a more reliable device for the Fire Inspectors to use
 when they are out on duty.
- We continue to work on paring our new Scott self-contained breathing apparatus(SCBA) mask with our handheld radios. Scott's new voice amplifier enhances the SCBA facepiece provides wireless voice communications with compatible handheld field radios and remote speaker microphones. To make all systems work together we will require software updates on our current radios. We are one of the first agencies to have all the equipment to attempt this connectivity.

The Difference between a Pooled Contingency and a reserve

A pooled contingency is a budgetary item that is funded each year at roughly the same level or percent. A pooled contingency is intended for smaller-scale, unplanned and unavoidable expenditures that occur in the normal course of a department's business. A reserve is the portion of a fund balance that is available for risk mitigation. It is a balance sheet (Statement of Net Position) item where the size of the reserve depends on the cumulative effect of surpluses and deficits over the District's history. A reserve is for the infrequent, highly consequential events like a rapid down turn in the District's net assessed value, or a natural disaster like COVID, where larger amounts of money will be needed to respond.

For the FY 2022 budget year, the pooled contingency is set at \$300,000 while the amount set as a reserve is set at \$15,154,624.

Motion to approve the following amended policies: Heat Illness Prevention Program, Outside Employment, Personnel Records, Member Speech, Expression, and Social Networking as presented.

Policy Manual

Heat Illness Prevention Program

907.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to promote member health and safety by establishing a heat illness prevention program requiring member participation and implementing an effective training program (see the Heat Illness Prevention Training Policy).

The intent is to establish methods to lower the risk of illness or injury due to exposure to high-heat working conditions and to establish fireground rehabilitation guidelines to ensure that the physical and mental condition of members does not deteriorate to the point that it negatively affects their safety or emergency operations.

907.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include:

Fireground rehabilitation - A system for on-scene management of firefighter heat stress, dehydration and fatigue. The primary goals of rehab are rehydration, rest and cooling, assessment of remaining work capacity and recognition and treatment of heat strain injuries.

Heat exhaustion - A condition caused by the loss of large amounts of fluid by sweating. A person suffering from heat exhaustion still sweats but experiences extreme weakness or fatigue, giddiness, nausea or headache. In more serious cases, the victim may vomit or lose consciousness. Skin may be clammy or moist, pale or flushed. Body temperature is normal to slightly elevated. Mild heat exhaustion will respond to copious water and a cool environment. Those with severe cases may require extended care for several days.

Heat stress - The aggregate of environmental and physical work factors that constitute the total heat load imposed on the body. Heat load is derived from two major sources:

- Internally generated metabolic heat, which is a by-product of chemical processes that
 occur within the cells, tissue and organs of firefighters exerting themselves in turnout
 clothing
- Externally imposed environmental heat, which influences the rate at which body heat can be exchanged with the environment and consequently the ease with which the body can regulate and maintain a normal temperature

Heat strain - The series of physiological responses to heat stress. These responses reflect the degree of heat stress. When the strain is excessive for the individual, a heat disorder (heat exhaustion or heat stroke) will follow.

Heat stroke - A condition where the body's temperature regulatory system fails, sweating becomes inadequate and the body's only effective means of removing excess heat is compromised. Early recognition and treatment of heat stroke is the only means of preventing permanent brain damage or death. Signs and symptoms of heat stroke may include mental confusion, convulsions, an altered level of consciousness and skin that is hot, usually dry and red or spotted. Body temperature is usually 104 degrees or higher.

Heat Illness Prevention Program

907.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Golder Ranch Fire District to require member participation in the heat illness prevention program and the accompanying training.

907.3 REQUIREMENTS

This heat illness prevention program shall apply to all emergency operations and training exercises where personnel are exposed to heavy physical exertion and/or extreme heat conditions.

A rehabilitation group will be established by the Incident Commander (IC) when conditions dictate that rest and rehabilitation are needed at an emergency scene. Rehabilitation considerations should include, but are not limited to:

- Length of the operation The one 60 minute cylinder, two 45 minute cylinders, or 45 minutes of strenuous activity rule should generally be observed. After the use of the self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) air bottles or 45 minutes of strenuous activity, a firefighter should be evaluated in the rehabilitation area. Rehabilitation should generally be considered for all working fires ore greater alarms. Prolonged motor vehicle incidents and heavy rescues in hot weather are other examples.
- Amount of exertion Captains should maintain an awareness of the exertion/ exhaustion level of crews. The degree of exertion can vary greatly in each incident. Individuals who are under-hydrated or are on the first day back after any gastrointestinal illness are particularly susceptible to early onset of heat illness.
- Adverse climatic conditions Temperatures in excess of 90 degrees have historically produced early onset of heat exhaustion and/or collapse. Rehabilitation efforts should generally be established when ambient air temperature is over 85 degrees and there is a potential for extended operations. High humidity also plays a role and should be considered.
- Communication It may be difficult for the IC to assess the exertion or exhaustion level of the firefighters. If a firefighter needs rest, they are responsible for communicating their needs to a supervisor. If one individual is experiencing heat exhaustion, supervisors should be aware that there may be additional firefighters in need of rehabilitation.

It is the responsibility of the IC to make an early determination of situations that may require a rehabilitation group and institute the appropriate rehabilitation efforts accordingly.

It is the responsibility of every Captain to monitor the condition of all firefighters for signs of heat stress or fatigue. When these conditions are noted, the officer shall advise the IC or assigned Incident Safety Officer and request assignment of the company to the rehabilitation group.

It is the responsibility of all personnel operating at an incident to report to their immediate supervisor if they feel the strain of overexertion. There is a point at which even the most physically fit individual becomes a liability rather than an asset due to intense physical exertion in turnout clothing. Taking 20 minutes in rehabilitation to cool down and rehydrate can assist in preventing illness and injury.

Outside Employment

1015.1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to establish guidelines to be followed by any Golder Ranch Fire District members considering outside employment.

1015.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Golder Ranch Fire District to allow members to engage in employment other than with the District if the Fire Chief determines that such outside employment is not in conflict with his/her duties and the duties, functions and responsibilities of the District.

Members shall not represent the District while performing employment outside the District.

1015.3 PROCEDURE

No member shall be employed or self-employed in any manner outside of District employment without prior written authorization from the Fire Chief.

Any member requesting authorization for outside employment must submit the request in writing and provide sufficient detail to enable the Fire Chief to determine whether to approve the request. At a minimum the request should include the number of hours, types of duties and the physical demands of the proposed employment.

To demonstrate compliance with this policy, all members must complete a Conflict of Interest/ Outside Employment Statement form at the time of initial employment and update it annually. In addition, changes in the member's personal or business activities that may impact their ability to comply with this policy must be reported in writing immediately upon occurrence. If in doubt about what constitutes outside employment and what information should be disclosed, contact Human Resources.

1015.4 PROHIBITED OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT

The Fire Chief, at his/her discretion, may deny any outside employment request submitted by a member seeking to engage in any activity which:

- (a) Involves the member's use of district time, facilities, equipment or supplies, or the use of the district badge, uniform, prestige or influence for private gain or advantage.
- (b) Involves the member's receipt or acceptance of any money or other consideration from anyone other than this district for the performance of an act which the member, if not performing such act, would be required or expected to render in the regular course of employment or as a part of the member's duties as a member of this district.
- (c) Involves the performance of an act in other than the member's capacity as a member of this district that may later be subject directly or indirectly to the control, inspection, review, audit or enforcement of any other member of this district.

- (d) Involves time demands that would render performance of the member's duties for the District less efficient.
- (e) Involves time demands that would affect the member's regular work shift or ability to respond to emergencies or mandated overtime.
- (f) Involves employment with an individual or organization that does business with the District.
- (g) Would otherwise compromise the ability of the District to conduct its business in an efficient manner.
- (h) Would give the appearance of impropriety or otherwise appear inconsistent, incompatible or in conflict with the member's employment with the District.
- (i) Full-time suppression personnel may not engage in any type of outside employment during the eight hours prior to their scheduled duty shift.

1015.5 WITHDRAWAL OF APPROVAL FOR OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT

The following circumstances may affect existing approval of outside employment:

- (a) Should a member's performance at the District decline to a point where it is evaluated by a supervisor as needing improvement to reach an overall level of competency, the Fire Chief may, at his/her discretion, withdraw approval for any outside employment.
- (b) Withdrawal of approval of outside employment may be included as a term or condition of sustained discipline.
- (c) If, at any time, a member's conduct or outside employment conflicts with the provisions of district policy, the approval for outside employment may be withdrawn.
- (d) When a member is unable to perform at a full-duty capacity due to an injury or other condition, approval of outside employment may be withdrawn until the member has returned to full-duty status for any of the following reasons:
 - 1. The outside employment is medically detrimental to the total recovery of the disabled member, as indicated by the district's medical advisers.
 - 2. The outside employment performed requires the same or similar physical ability as would be required of an on-duty member.
 - 3. The member fails to make timely notice of his/her intention to continue outside employment to his/her supervisor.
- (e) Approval of outside employment may be withdrawn if the members takes paid leave for the purpose of outside employment.

1015.6 APPEALS

If a member's outside employment request is denied or withdrawn, the member should be informed of the action and reason in writing.

The member may file a written notice of appeal to the Fire Chief within 10 days of the date of the written denial or withdrawal.

If the member's appeal is denied, the member may file a grievance pursuant to the procedure set forth in the current collective bargaining agreement.

1015.7 CHANGES IN OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT STATUS

If a member terminates his/her outside employment, the member should promptly submit written notification of such termination to the Fire Chief. Any subsequent request for renewal or continued outside employment should be processed and approved through normal procedures set forth in this policy.

Members should also promptly submit in writing to the Fire Chief any material changes in outside employment, including any change in the number of hours, types of duties or demands of any approved outside employment. Members who are uncertain whether a change in outside employment is material should report the change.

District members who are engaged in outside employment while on full duty and are placed on disability leave or temporary modified duty due to illness or injury should inform their immediate supervisor in writing as soon as practicable regarding whether they intend to continue to engage in outside employment while on leave or modified-duty status.

1015.8 PROHIBITED USE OF DISTRICT RESOURCES

Members are prohibited from using any district equipment or resources in the course of or for the benefit of any outside employment. This includes access to official records or databases of this district or other agencies through the member's position with this district.

Personnel Records

1018.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to establish the maintenance of, retention of, and access to personnel files in accordance with established law.

1018.1.1 PERSONNEL RECORDS DEFINED

Personnel records shall include any record maintained under an individual member's name relating to:

- (a) Personal data, including marital status, family members, educational, and employment history or similar information.
- (b) Medical history, including medical leave-of-absence forms, fitness-for-duty examinations, workers' compensation records, medical releases, and all other records that reveal a member's past, current or future medical conditions.
- (c) Election of employee benefits.
- (d) Member advancement, appraisal or discipline, including member responses to disciplinary actions (ARS § 39-128).
- (e) Complaints or investigations of complaints concerning an event or transaction in which the member participated that pertain to the manner in which the member performed official duties.
- (f) Any information that if disclosed would constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

1018.1.2 EMPLOYEE RECORD LOCATIONS

Personnel records will generally be maintained in one of the following files:

District central file - Any file maintained in the office of the District or Human Resources as a permanent record of a member's employment with the District.

Division Supervisor file - Any file maintained internally by a member's supervisor in an assigned division for the purpose of collecting information to prepare performance evaluations.

Supervisor log entries - Any written comment, excluding actual performance evaluations, made by a supervisor, concerning the performance or conduct of a member of the District.

Training file - Any file containing the training records of a member.

Investigations file - Any file containing written comments regarding harassment or discrimination claims, misconduct claims, background investigations, or reference check responses. Separate records must be maintained for sustained and unsustained investigations.

Medical file - Any separately maintained file that exclusively contains material relating to a member's medical history.

Personnel Records

1018.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the District to maintain the confidentiality of its members' personnel records.

1018.3 REQUESTS FOR DISCLOSURE

All records kept by Arizona public agencies are considered public unless they are covered by specific disclosure statutes (ARS § 39-121 et seq.).

Upon receipt of a request for disclosure of personnel records, the member's supervisor shall be notified and shall be responsible for notifying the affected member as soon as practicable that such a request has been made.

The Custodian of Records shall ensure that an appropriate response to the request is made in a timely manner, in accordance with applicable law. In many cases, this may require assistance of the district's legal counsel.

All requests for the disclosure of personnel records that result in access to a member's file shall be logged in the corresponding file.

Nothing in this section is intended to preclude review of personnel files by supervisors, the Fire Board, District's Attorney or attorneys or representatives of the District in connection with official business.

1018.4 RELEASE OF CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION

Except as provided by this policy or pursuant to lawful process, no information contained in any confidential personnel file shall be disclosed to any unauthorized person without the express prior consent of the involved member or the written authorization of the Fire Chief or the authorized designee.

1018.5 MEMBER ACCESS TO OWN FILE

Any member may request access to their own personnel file during the normal business hours of the individual responsible for maintaining such files.

Any member seeking the removal of any item from their personnel file shall submit a written request to the Fire Chief via the chain of command. The District shall thereafter remove any such item, if appropriate, or as soon as practicable provide the member with a written explanation why the contested item will not be removed.

The request and the district's written response shall be retained, with the contested item, in the personnel file. Nothing herein shall require the removal of any item from the file.

Members may be restricted from accessing files containing any of the following information:

 Ongoing investigations, to the extent the District, in its sole discretion, determines that disclosure could jeopardize or compromise the investigation, pending final disposition or notice to the member of the intent to discipline.

Member Speech, Expression and Social Networking

1044.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy is intended to address issues associated with member use of social networking sites and to provide guidelines for the regulation and balancing of member speech and expression with the needs of the District.

Nothing in this policy is intended to prohibit or infringe upon any communication, speech or expression that is protected or privileged under law. This includes speech and expression protected under state or federal constitutions as well as labor or other applicable laws. For example, this policy does not limit an employee from speaking as a private citizen, including acting as an authorized member of a recognized union, about matters of public concern, such as misconduct or corruption.

Members are encouraged to consult with their supervisor regarding any questions arising from the application or potential application of this policy.

1044.1.1 APPLICABILITY

This policy applies to all forms of communication including, but not limited to, film, video, print media, public or private speech, and use of all Internet services, including the Web, email, file transfer, remote computer access, news services, social networking, social media, instant messaging, blogs, forums, video and other file-sharing sites.

1044.2 POLICY

Public employees occupy a trusted position in the community, and thus, their statements have the potential to contravene the policies and performance of this district. Due to the nature of the work and influence associated with the fire profession, it is necessary that members of this district be subject to certain reasonable limitations on their speech and expression. To achieve its mission and efficiently provide service to the public, the Golder Ranch Fire District will carefully balance the individual member's rights against the district's needs and interests when exercising a reasonable degree of control over its members' speech and expression.

1044.3 SAFETY

Members should consider carefully the implications of their speech or any other form of expression when using the Internet. Speech and expression that may negatively affect the safety of the Golder Ranch Fire District members, such as posting personal information in a public forum, can result in compromising a member's home address or family ties. Members should therefore not disseminate or post any information on any forum or medium that could reasonably be anticipated to compromise the safety of any member, a member's family or associates. Examples of the type of information that could reasonably be expected to compromise safety include:

Disclosing the address of a fellow firefighter.

Otherwise disclosing where another firefighter can be located off-duty.

1044.4 PROHIBITED SPEECH, EXPRESSION AND CONDUCT

To meet the district's safety, performance and public-trust needs, the following is prohibited unless the speech is otherwise protected (for example, an employee speaking as a private citizen, including acting as an authorized member of a recognized union, on a matter of public concern):

- (a) Speech or expression made pursuant to an official duty that compromises or damages the mission, function, reputation or professionalism of the Golder Ranch Fire District or its members.
- (b) Speech or expression that, while not made pursuant to an official duty, is linked to, or related to, the Golder Ranch Fire District and compromises or damages the mission, function, reputation or professionalism of the Golder Ranch Fire District or its members. Examples may include:
 - 1. Statements that indicate disregard for the law of the state or U.S. Constitution.
 - 2. Expression that demonstrates support for criminal activity.
 - 3. Participating in sexually explicit photographs or videos.
- (c) Speech or expression that could reasonably be foreseen as having a negative impact on the credibility of the member as a witness. For example, posting statements or expressions to a website that glorify or endorse dishonesty, unlawful discrimination or illegal behavior.
- (d) Speech or expression of any form that could reasonably be foreseen as having a negative impact on the safety of the members of the District.
- (e) Speech or expression that is contrary to the canons of the Firefighters' Code of Ethics as adopted by the Golder Ranch Fire District.
- (f) Use or disclosure, through whatever means, of any information, photograph, video or other recording obtained or accessible as a result of employment with the District for financial or personal gain, or any disclosure of such materials without the express authorization of the Fire Chief or the authorized designee.
- (g) Posting, transmitting or disseminating any photographs, video or audio recordings, likenesses or images of district logos, emblems, uniforms, badges, patches, marked vehicles, equipment or other material that specifically identifies the Golder Ranch Fire District on any personal or social networking or other website or web page, without the express authorization of the Fire Chief.
- (h) Accessing websites for non-authorized purposes, or use of any personal communication device, game device or media device, whether personally or district-owned, for personal purposes while on-duty, except in the following circumstances:
 - 1. When brief personal communication may be warranted by the circumstances (e.g., inform family of extended hours).

2. During authorized breaks; however, such usage should be limited as much as practicable to areas out of sight and sound of the public and shall not be disruptive to the work environment.

Members must take reasonable and prompt action to remove any content, including content posted by others, that is in violation of this policy from any web page or website maintained by the member (e.g., social or personal website).

1044.4.1 UNAUTHORIZED ENDORSEMENTS AND ADVERTISEMENTS

Although members are not restricted from engaging in the following activities as private citizens or as authorized members of a recognized bargaining unit, members may not represent the Golder Ranch Fire District or identify themselves in any way that could be reasonably perceived as representing the Golder Ranch Fire District in order to do any of the following, unless specifically authorized by the Fire Chief:

- (a) Endorse, support, oppose or contradict any political campaign or initiative
- (b) Endorse, support, oppose or contradict any social issue, cause or religion
- (c) Endorse, support or oppose any product, service, company or other commercial entity
- (d) Appear in any commercial, social or nonprofit publication or any motion picture, film, video, public broadcast or on any website

Additionally, when it can reasonably be construed that a member, acting in his/her individual capacity or through an outside group or organization (e.g., bargaining group), is affiliated with this district, the member shall give a specific disclaiming statement that any such speech or expression is not representative of the Golder Ranch Fire District.

Members retain their right to vote as they choose, to support candidates of their choice and to express their opinions as private citizens, including as authorized members of a recognized bargaining unit, on political subjects and candidates at all times while off-duty. However, members may not use their official authority or influence to interfere with or affect the result of an election or a nomination for office. Members are also prohibited from directly or indirectly using their official authority to coerce, command or advise another member to pay, lend or contribute anything of value to a party, committee, organization, agency or person for political purposes (5 USC § 1502).

1044.4.2 POLITICAL ACTIVITY

No member shall be prohibited from engaging in political activity, unless otherwise prohibited by law, in violation of district policy or any time a member is on-duty or in uniform.

Members shall not be coerced or required to engage in political activity.

1044.5 PRIVACY EXPECTATION

Members forfeit any expectation of privacy with regard to emails, texts or anything published, shared, transmitted or maintained through file-sharing software or any Internet site that is accessed, transmitted, received or reviewed on any district technology system.

The District reserves the right to access, audit and disclose, for whatever reason, any message, including attachments, and any information accessed, transmitted, received or reviewed over any technology that is issued or maintained by the District, including the district email system, computer network or any information placed into storage on any district system or device. This includes records of all keystrokes or Web-browsing history made at any district computer or over any district network. The fact that access to a database, service or website requires a username or password will not create an expectation of privacy if it is accessed through district computers, electronic devices or networks.

1044.6 CONSIDERATIONS

In determining whether to grant authorization of any speech or conduct that is prohibited under this policy, the factors that the Fire Chief or the authorized designee should consider include:

- (a) Whether the speech or conduct would negatively affect the efficiency of delivering public services.
- (b) Whether the speech or conduct would be contrary to the good order of the District or the efficiency or morale of its members.
- (c) Whether the speech or conduct would reflect unfavorably upon the District.
- (d) Whether the speech or conduct would negatively affect the member's appearance of impartiality in the performance of his/her duties.
- (e) Whether similar speech or conduct has been previously authorized.
- (f) Whether the speech or conduct may be protected and outweighs any interest of the District.

1044.7 TRAINING

Subject to available resources, the District should provide training regarding member speech and the use of social networking to firefighters and supervisors.



EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This Employment Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into effective as of the 1st day of July, 2021, by and between Golder Ranch Fire District, an Arizona fire district (the "District") and Randy Karrer ("Karrer").

- A. For purposes of this Agreement and Karrer's employment with the District, the District acts through the authority of the Golder Ranch Fire District governing board (the "Board").
- B. As of March, 2010, the District selected Karrer to serve as its Fire Chief. The District desires Karrer to continue to serve as Fire Chief upon the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement and desires a multi-year agreement to provide continued stability for the District and its Fire Chief.
- C. Karrer desires to continue to serve as the District's Fire Chief on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

For the mutual promises set forth in this Agreement, Karrer and the District agree as follows:

- 1. **Duties**. During the term of his employment, Karrer shall spend his full time and best efforts on behalf of the District as its Fire Chief and shall carry out the responsibilities described in the job description attached as Exhibit A to this Agreement and as may be amended and modified from time to time by direction of the Golder Ranch Fire Board.
- 2. **Term**. The term of this Agreement is for a period commencing as of July 1, 2021 through March 31, 2023, unless sooner terminated pursuant to this Agreement. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted to violate any Arizona Statute and the parties acknowledge that this Agreement shall terminate in the event the funds are unavailable or are not appropriated by the District for payment pursuant to this Agreement.
- 3. **Compensation**. The District shall pay Karrer the following salary and benefits:
 - A. Salary. Salary shall be based on an annualized rate of \$185,325.00.
 - B. **Deferred Compensation**.
 - 1. The District will pay Karrer annual Deferred Compensation in the amount of \$30,000.00 as Deferred Compensation. Fifty percent of the annual amount shall be paid to the District's deferred compensation carrier (Nationwide or such other deferred compensation carrier as may be designated from time to time) on or within seven days following the first pay period after January 1 and the remaining fifty percent on or within seven days following

- the first pay period after July 1 of each year including the current year.
- 2. Deferred Compensation for partial years will be prorated. To the extent permitted by the District's deferred compensation provider, the District will transfer ownership of said plan or retirement fund to an appropriate account of the Chiefs choice upon termination of Chief's employment, whether voluntary or involuntary.
- C. Clothing and Uniform Allowance. The District shall provide Karrer a clothing and uniform in the amount of \$1,200 annually.
- D. **Medical and Dental Coverage**. To the extent legally permissible, the District shall provide Karrer and Karrer's spouse and eligible dependents with medical and dental coverage for the term of this Agreement. In the alternative, Karrer shall receive an annual Insurance Allowance in the amount of \$10,000.
- E. **Sick Leave and Vacation Time**. Sick leave and vacation time benefits shall be accrued and capped at the same rate as other District personnel which is based on years of service.
- F. Use It Or Lose It Leave. The District shall allow an additional annual leave in the amount of ten (10) days per calendar year. For purposes of this Agreement, Use It Or Lose It Leave is additional vacation leave which cannot be accrued or carried over to the following year. Use It or Lose It Leave must be exhausted before Chief can use vacation leave.
- G. **District Benefits**. Any other benefits not specifically addressed in this Agreement will be according to the District's benefit plan or plans in effect available to Golder Ranch Fire District employees as may be amended from time to time.
- H. **Annual Compensation Review**. The Fire Board will review, evaluate and possibly adjust the compensation, benefits and all other terms and conditions of this Agreement on an annual basis.
- I. **Reimbursements**. Karrer shall be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred for participation in educational, civic and charitable events for professional development and for representing the District within Oro Valley, Pima and Pinal Counties, Arizona and nationally.
- J. Legal Review. Karrer shall be reimbursed for reasonable attorney's fees and associated legal expense up to \$5,000 annually for consultation with an independent counsel of his choosing when, in his discretion, Karrer determines it would be beneficial to have independent legal consultation regarding potential for personal liability arising from District matters.

- 4. **Performance Review**. The District may review Karrer's performance at any time including at the request of Karrer. The Fire Board shall conduct the performance reviews on an annual basis.
- 5. **Termination**. In addition to the provisions of Paragraph 2 above, this Agreement may be terminated by the District only for good cause. Examples of good cause include but are not limited to conviction of a felony, embezzlement, drunkenness on the job, abuse of position as Fire Chief, failure to represent the District in a professional manner or dereliction of duties.
- 6. **Notice of Termination**. Neither party shall terminate this Agreement, without sixty days' notice, unless the circumstances justify an immediate termination, in which case Karrer shall be placed immediately on paid leave until the District makes a determination as to whether or not the Agreement may be terminated for good cause.
- 7. **Notice**. Any notice permitted or required under this Agreement shall be in writing, personally delivered or mailed, first class mail, postage prepaid, to the addressee at the address set forth below. Notice shall be deemed complete upon delivery in person or three (3) business days after mailing. The parties may change their addresses for notice from time to time by notice in writing to the other parties. The parties shall be given notice at:

- 8. **Death and Disability**. If in the line of duty during the term of this Agreement Karrer dies or becomes disabled or otherwise becomes unable to perform any of his duties under this Agreement, the District shall continue medical coverage consistent with Paragraph 3(d) above from the District's then current medical coverage in a plan reasonably similar to the benefits as Karrer received immediately prior to such death or disability for a period of twelve months.
- 9. **District Policy**. Karrer and the District acknowledge that the District adopted Golder Ranch Fire District Human Resources Policy Guidelines (the "Guidelines"). Karrer shall abide by the terms and conditions of the Guidelines except in any specific instance where the specific terms of this Agreement supersede a specific term of the Guidelines, in which case the terms of this Agreement shall govern.

10. Arizona Law . Arizona Law shall govern this Agreement. Venue shall be in Pima County, Arizona.
